Course Description and Objectives

This course provides an introduction to qualitative research methods. While much sociological research relies on data collected by others, this course provides insights into the theories and practices that guide original qualitative data collection on our social world. Students will begin by learning the principles of qualitative methods and research design, and then become familiar with common qualitative research methods, including ethnography, in-depth interviewing, focus groups, and content analysis. Throughout the course, students will have the opportunity to collect and analyze their own original qualitative data with the goal of communicating complex findings and developing data literacy.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Understand the purpose and value of qualitative methods
- Become familiar with different methods in qualitative research
- Collect and analyze original qualitative data
- Demonstrate the ability to analyze qualitative data
- Develop data literacy and understand the constraints of scientific claims-making

Prerequisites:

A basic understanding of sociology is required for this class. Students must have completed SOCI 1510 and hold advanced (junior of senior) standing to be eligible for this course. This course is required for Sociology majors, with a grade of C or better for graduation.

Materials

The required book is available at the UNT Bookstore and online.

Course Requirements & Grades

The final grade in the course has different ways to evaluate student learning. The assessment in this class involves two exams (30%), four data collection assignments (40%), and regular discussions and in-class activities to encourage your engagement and participation (30%).

Exams

Two exams will cover both the readings and other materials presented in class. Each exam is worth 15% of your grade and comprise of 30% of your final grade. Please mark your calendars for the dates listed in Canvas. The dates of these exams will not change. Exams will be a combination of multiple choice, true/false, and short answer. None are cumulative. There is no final exam in this class.

Participation

Participation is worth 30% of your total grade, which breaks down to 2% each week. This will be assessed in two ways: 1) attendance and 2) in-class discussion and exercises. Attendance is mandatory and will follow the policies listed below. Each week, there will also be exercises in class that are designed to assess progress towards learning objectives and prepare for the assignments and exams.

<u>Assignments</u>

There are four assignments in this course, which will allow you to collect and then analyze your own qualitative data. These are each worth 10% of your grade, for a total of 40%. Each are worth 100 points, and will be graded according to a rubric, which you can view in advance on Canvas.

- Assignment #1: Ethnographic Fieldnote
- Assignment #2: In-depth Interview
- Assignment #3: Content Analysis
- Assignment #4: Coding Qualitative Data

We will hold in-class workshops before the assignments are due to discuss the requirements and brainstorm sites, ideas, and people.

Course Policies

Attendance

Research has shown that students who attend class are more likely to be successful. Students are thus expected to attend all class meetings unless you have an excused absence such as active military service, religious holy day, official university function (as stated in the <u>Student Attendance and Authorized Absences Policy</u>), or a contagious illness. Each student may take <u>two personal absences</u> during the semester for something other than these issues. You <u>must</u> communicate with me prior to being absent so we can discuss and mitigate the impact of the absence on your learning.

On the first day, we will establish a seating chart for our indoor classroom. You are expected to sit in your assigned seat for all indoor seminars. If you are unable to attend class in person, I will happily accommodate this by providing lecture notes, recording class sessions, and providing a Zoom alternative, if possible.

Communication Policy

The instructor will reply to emails within 24 hours and within the time frame of 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Please plan accordingly before exams and due dates. Before emailing, please 1) check the syllabus; 2) refer to your class notes; and/or 3) ask a classmate directly or via the General Q&A discussion board on Canvas. Students are expected to regularly check Canvas. Please set your communication preferences so that you are notified of announcements and grade submissions.

All written assignments will be evaluated with <u>Turnitin</u> (https://www.turnitin.com), which sends both the student and instructor an originality report.

You earn the grade you receive in this class. I do not curve or scale exams, assignments, or final grades. No extra credit will be offered. If you become concerned about your grades, meet with me immediately.

Except in extreme circumstances, I do not give incompletes. Students must request an incomplete in writing at least one week before final exam week. Please include documentation of the reason that the course cannot be completed before the end of the semester. Please note that I can only considered these requests if at least 50% of course exams and assignments have been completed with a passing grade.

Late Work

Under ordinary circumstances, no makeup exams will be given and no late work will be accepted. If you need extensions, please reach out *in advance*. Assignments and exams may be rescheduled only under exceptional circumstances (instances of disability, illness, or emergency) and with *prior* instructor consent. Please let me know as soon as possible if you need to reschedule an exam.
