Course Description:

This "Advanced Topics in Japanese Culture" course will focus on the topic of Japanese Geography and Cuisine. We will cover various aspects of geography and culture, including major geographic features and the sense of Japanese regional identity. We will also learn about Japanese cuisine, including staple foods, popular foods and regional foods. Throughout the course, we will be using spoken and written Japanese to explore these topics, so it will be an opportunity to review and improve your skills overall, especially in speaking and listening.

The objectives of this course are to:

- Gain new knowledge about Japanese geography and cuisine, including how to cook Japanese dishes
- Increase vocabulary, with new terms related to food and geography
- Improve your speaking, listening and reading skills
- Review and solidify basic kanji through mnemonics

Speaking:

We will have group discussions and presentations inside the classroom and also interactions with native speakers outside the classroom (surveying people about food and/or their hometowns). We will also invite guest speakers from different regions of Japan and do activities such as cooking together.

Reading and Listening:

We will use articles online, and watch mp4 videos about different regions and food. By using those materials, we will learn: (a) how to get main ideas, and (b) how to simplify and explain key concepts of the materials.

<u>Kanji</u>:

We will review the kanji you learned in your previous Japanese classes. The kanji book has illustrations and mnemonic hints that will help you refresh your memory.

As part of participation, you will be asked to make three presentations in class. Detail information will be given in class. Full attendance & participation credit (20 %) will be given to those who are present for the entire class period, prepared for class including the presentations, and fully participating in all activities. Partial attendance, frequent tardiness, or lack of participation will result in deduction of points. Absences will <u>only</u> be excused in the case of university-sponsored activities, religious holidays, military service, or extended illness with documentation. If you are absent <u>five times or more</u> regardless of reasons with/without appropriate documents, you will be dropped from the class for non-attendance.

Daily Homework: Practicing Japanese every day and studying for the class are also very important for successful Japanese learning. Daily homework consists of (a) assignments for review from the workbook, (b) listening practice (audio file is on Blackboard) speaking practice, (c) reading on Blackboard. Assignments are listed in the schedule and are due in class and (d) create the vocabulary list. You must turn in the homework in class to receive full credit.

<u>Quizzes:</u> eight quizzes are given in class. Each quiz includes questions about the kanji, the grammar, the reading one material loud, the new vocabulary at the end of each chapter. The detailed information on quizzes will be given in class.

<u>**Tests:**</u> two tests are administered in class twice during this course. It will cover the kanji section, the listening section, the oral section, and the reading & writing section. I will offer review materials and guidelines for the tests in class.

<u>Conversation leader</u>: You are expected to lead conversational groups in class and outside the classroom. Detailed information and the schedule for practice outside the classroom will be given in class.

<u>Create a book about Japan</u>: The exam will be cumulative and be comprehensive. I will provide detailed information in class.

Extra credits: Extra credit will be given in this course. More detailed information will be provided in class.

Academic Honesty:

Homework assignments and tests should be true representations of your effort and learning. Plagiarism (i.e., copying another person's work and presenting it as your own work) or cheating (i.e., providing answers for someone else or getting answers from someone else) are prohibited. In addition, we ask that no online translation tools are used when completing writing assignments.
