**Course Description & Objectives:**

This course is designed to be able to discuss issues in informal and formal situations across a variety of familiar topics in Japanese. By exploring five themes related to Japanese society (history, craftsmanship, four seasons and poetry, politics, and Japanese thoughts and perspectives), we will learn new vocabulary, kanji and grammar and expand the socio-cultural knowledge as we go along. We will read about, discuss and write about each theme. You will complete a research project and give a presentation on a topic of your choice.

**Learning Outcomes:**

- Learn about five aspects of contemporary Japanese society
- Develop a broader range of vocabulary and kanji reading skills
- Increase overall communicative ability and confidence in Japanese
- Control your level of politeness and appropriateness in writing and speech

**Attendance & Participation:** Foreign language learning is a cumulative process, and it is very important that you come to class. Attendance and active participation in class are mandatory and absolutely essential to your success in learning Japanese. Partial attendance, frequent tardiness, or lack of participation will result in deduction of points. Absences will **only** be excused in the case of university-sponsored activities, religious holidays, military service, or extended illness with documentation. If you are absent **four times (total of two weeks) or more regardless of reasons with/without appropriate documents**, you will be dropped from the class for non-attendance.

**Daily Homework:** Practicing Japanese every day and studying for the class are also very important for successful Japanese learning. Daily homework consists of (a) assignments for review from the workbook, (b) listening practice (audio files are on Blackboard), and (c) writing and reading assignments (on Blackboard). Assignments are listed in the schedule and are due in class. You must turn in the homework in class to receive full credit.

**Quizzes:** ten quizzes are given in class. Each quiz includes questions about the kanji, the grammar, and the new vocabulary at the end of each chapter. The detailed information on quizzes will be given in class.

**Short Presentations:** You are expected to make a short presentation on topics in Japanese at the end of each chapter in class. Detailed information will be given in class.

**Poems and Essays:** You are expected to write 8 poems and explain each in Japanese. Detailed information will be given in class.

**Project and Presentation:** You are expected to write an essay and present in Japanese. Detailed information will be given in class.

Homework assignments and tests should be true representations of your effort and learning. Plagiarism (i.e., copying another person's work and presenting it as your own work) or cheating (i.e., providing answers for someone else or getting answers from someone else) are prohibited.
