- Improve your speaking and reading skills

## Attendance, Participation and Preparation (15%):

Class attendance is mandatory. You are also expected to attend class meetings regularly and to abide by the attendance policy established for the course. Repeated unexcused absences and tardiness will affect

your grade significantly. You are also expected to make small presentations about given topics. After eighth absences, you will receive a failing grade for the class. [See the comments that I made in the other syllabus about the wording for this section.] It is important that you communicate with the professor and the instructional team prior to being absent, so you, the professor, and the instructional team can discuss and mitigate the impact of the absence on your attainment of course learning goals. Please inform the professor and instructional team if you are unable to attend class meetings because you are ill, in mindfulness of the health and safety of everyone in our community.

#### **Face Coverings**

**Quizzes (20%):** Five quizzes will be give online. Each quiz includes questions about the kanji and the new words. Detailed information on quizzes will be given in Canvas.

**Tests (20%) and the Final Exam (15%):** Two comprehensive tests and the final exam will be given in class. These are comprehension exams, based on the reading materials and contents covered in class. Detailed instructions will be given in class.

**Assignments (15%):** You are expected to read assigned materials and complete comprehension sheets ahead of class. The sheets will be collected in class and graded.

**Travel Guidebook (15%):** You will be asked to write a travel guidebook with Haiku about Japan, including a table of content (50 pages), drawings and names with brief descriptions on the locations and regional specialty foods. More detailed information will be provided in class.

If you miss homework, quizzes, or exams because of an excused absence, you may make up the work according to a schedule agreed by you and the professor. If your absence is not excused, you will receive a grade of zero (0) for any homework assignment due that day and/or for any quiz/exam given that day.
