Course description:

In order to gain a deeper understanding of Japanese society, we will examine cultural values such as belief systems, values systems, attitudes, and morals that shape the lives of Japanese people in Japanese society. Our focus will be placed on how these cultural values have/have not been transformed in contemporary Japan. We will also explore ramifications for not only Japanese themselves, but also others in the international community. The content is as follows: views/beliefs on food, marriages and family, work, community, and life and death. This course will combine group discussion, and presentation through the collaborative effort of all students.

The objectives of this course are to:

- Identify and summarize the characteristics that define the changing and unchanging values of Japanese society.
- Display critical understanding of the conditions of the (un)changing cultural values in contemporary society.
- Compare Japanese cultural values with those of the United States and/or other countries.
- Develop a broader range of vocabulary and control appropriateness in writing and speech.

Homework:

Weekly homework consists of (a) reading, (b) listening (audio files are on Blackboard), and (c) writing. Detailed information on homework assignments is listed on blackboard. You must turn in the homework on the due date in class to receive full credit.

Quizzes:

Seven quizzes are given at the end of each reading in class. Each quiz includes questions about the new vocabulary and comprehension questions. Detailed information on quizzes will be given in class.

Presentations:

You are expected to make two presentations on topics in Japanese in class. Detailed information will be given in class.

Writings:

You are expected to write two essays based on/associated with your presentations in Japanese. Detailed information will be given in class.

Course Evaluation:

The Student Evaluation, SPOT, will be available at the end of the semester, providing you a chance to comment on this class. The SPOT is a requirement for all organized classes at UNT, and responses are used by the department in evaluating the faculty.

Academic Honesty:
