Course Description

THEA 2340 introduces students to theatre as a dynamic and collaborative art form through the study of scripts, performances, and design elements. Divided into five thematic units, the course fosters critical thinking, creative expression, and cultural awareness. Students will explore key historical moments, important dramatic works, influential theatrical artists, stage techniques, and production processes while examining how theatre reflects, challenges, and contributes to social, cultural, and political conversations. If this course is completely successful, students will gain a deeper understanding and appreciation of the theatre arts and its importance in our society.

Since this class is 16 weeks, please plan on 4-6 hours' worth of work a week. This may be more or less depending on the content. Class work may be completed on your own time; however, please pay careful attention to due dates as those are firm.

All work will be due by 11:59PM on the due date (unless otherwise stated). Please check due dates on the syllabus course calendar as well as Canvas.

- CO 1 - Articulate, interpret, and express their understanding of theatrical works through written, verbal, and/or creative responses.

- CO 2 - Analyze and evaluate theatrical texts and performances to develop a deeper understanding of theatre's artistic and cultural significance.
- CO 3 - Identify, discuss, and assess how theatre reflects, challenges, and contributes to social, cultural, and/or political conversations.
- CO 4 - Demonstrate an understanding of theatre's collaborative nature through group discussions and assessments.

Course Requirements/Schedule

Required Assignments and Assessments:

- o **SYLLABUS QUIZ:** After reading the syllabus, each student is required to take a quiz acknowledging they have read and understand what is being asked of them in this course, how the course will run, and more.
- o **DISCUSSION BOARDS:** Discussion Boards allow for students to engage in course material and have engaging conversations with fellow classmates. *It is required to respond thoughtfully to at least 2 other classmates post.*
- o **UNIT QUIZZES:** A quiz based on the information learned in the unit. It is designed to test the student's comprehension of the unit's material and objective.
- o **WESTERN AND EASTERN THEATER HISTORY QUIZZES:** A short quiz based on assigned theatrical time periods.

- o **ARTICLE RESPONSE:** This response is a 400-word written analysis of current theatre trends, works, and productions and their relation to class material based off a theatre article. The instructor will provide the article.
- o **GENRES ANALYSIS ESSAY:** In this essay, students will take class terminology of theatrical genres/forms and analyze a short play.
- o **ANALYSIS QUIZZES:** These quizzes will be based on lectures from Unit #3 as well as the chosen script for Unit #3.
- o **LONELY IMPULSE PLAY QUIZ:** A short quiz based on the final play to assess the student's comprehension of the material.
- o **FINAL PLAY RESEARCH AND DESIGN PROJECT:** This is a comprehensive project over the course materials and objectives. The students will analyze a play through knowledge, methods, and techniques acquired from the course content.
- o **FINAL EXAM:** A final comprehensive test of the whole course.

Important Notice for F-1 Students taking Distance Education Courses

Federal Regulation

To read detailed Immigration and Customs Enforcement regulations for F-1 students taking online courses, please go to the [Electronic Code of Federal Regulations website](http://www.ecfr.gov/) (<http://www.ecfr.gov/>). The specific portion concerning distance education courses is located at Title 8 CFR 214.2 Paragraph (f)(6)(i)(G).

The paragraph reads: (G) For F-1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken on-line or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination or other purposes integral to completion of the class. An on-line or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F-1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no on-line or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

F-1 Visa Regulations: Federal regulations state that students may apply only 3 fully-online semester credit hours (SCH) to the hours required for full-time status for [F-1 Visa \(DOC\)](#) holders. Full-time status for F-1 Visa students is 12 hours for undergraduates and 9 hours for graduate students.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experience integral to the completion of this course. If such an on-campus activity is required, it is the student's responsibility to do the following:

- (1) Submit a written request to the instructor for an on-campus experiential component within one week of the start of the course.
- (2) Ensure that the activity on campus takes place and the instructor documents it in writing with a notice sent to the International Student and Scholar Services Office. ISSS has a form available that you may use for this purpose.
