APPLIED LESSONS: JAZZ VOICE

Course Objectives

Students will be able to:

- Demonstrate appropriate technique and style when performing vocal jazz.
- Exhibit strong practice and performance habits.
- Develop a wide range of skills as they progress towards becoming a well-rounded musician.

Required Materials for Each Lesson

- Phone, laptop, or other recording device to record your lessons.
- Filled water bottle
- Music, handouts, etc. from previous weeks
- Pencil and paper for notes
- A warmed up voice!

Attendance Policy

Since this is an individual class meant to tend to your specific musical wants/needs attendance is **MANDATORY**, any unexcused absences may result in the lowering of your grade by 5% per absence.

In the event that you cannot attend a lesson and need to reschedule it is your responsibility to:

- 1. Swap lesson times with another student of mine (reference email "S24 Lesson Times" sent at the beginning of the semester) and notify me via email of said swap.
- 2. Or if you are unable to swap lesson times with another student contact me via email so we can find another time to make up your lesson.

In the case of a known absence written e-mail communication is required at least <u>24-HOURS BEFORE ABSENCE</u> notifying me of your need to reschedule. In emergency circumstances please communicate your absence/tardiness to me via text (562) 896-1842.

In addition to absences, consistent tardiness will not be accepted. Three tardies will count as one unexcused absence.

Grading Policy

Each week, you will be given an assignment to go along with the assigned technique practice. This could be anything from working on a transcription to developing piano skills to creating a lead sheet. The grade for this assignment will be reflected in your weekly lesson grade. Your overall lessons grade is determined by the following breakdown:

- 65% Weekly Lessons: 13 lessons make each week worth 5% of your grade.
 - A = Completely prepared; all assignments completed with excellent quality
 - B = Moderately prepared; most assignments completed with good quality
 - C = Somewhat prepared; some assignments completed with good quality, others not at all or poor quality
 - D = Poorly prepared; most assignments not completed or with very poor quality
 - F = Completely unprepared.

 Prior to your jury you will print and fill out 6 copies of your jury form (one for each Professor and all 4 TFs), and bring this and any other required materials to your jury.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Financial Aid and Satisfactory Academic Progress

<u>Undergraduates</u>

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total hours registered. Students cannot exceed attempted credit hours above 150% of their required degree plan. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.

Students holding music scholarships must maintain a minimum 2.5 overall cumulative GPA and 3.0 cumulative GPA in music courses.

If at any point you consider dropping this or any other course, please be advised that the decision to do so may have the potential to affect your current and future financial aid eligibility. It is recommended that you schedule a meeting with an academic advisor in your college or visit the Student Financial Aid and Scholarships office to discuss dropping a course before doing so.

<u>Graduates</u>

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total registered hours per term. Music scholarships require a 3.5 cumulative GPA. Students cannot exceed maximum timeframes established based on the published length of the graduate program. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.

If at any point you consider dropping this or any other course, please be advised that the decision to do so may have the potential to affect your current and future financial aid eligibility. It is recommended you schedule a meeting with an academic advisor in your college, an advisor in UNT-International or visit the Student Financial Aid and Scholarships office to discuss dropping a course.
