**Description\*:** Fibers, fabric construction and finishes applied to selection, use, and care of fabrics.

Prerequisite: None.

**Objectives:** 

1. Identify basic fibers by generic and trade names.

- Differentiate yarns and fabrics by type and construction.
- 3. Predict fabric performance by fiber, yarn, fabric, and finish characteristics.
- 4. Select textile components that are most appropriate according to product and intended end use.

## **Required Texts:**

- Required: Swatch Reference Guide for Fashion Fabrics, Third Edition Young
- Recommended: Kadolph, S. J. (2016) *Textiles.* (12<sup>th</sup> ed.). New Jersey: Prentice Hall
