Required Text: All texts will be provided either digitally, as hard copies, or both. *Dante's Inferno* is the longest text we will read, so I do suggest getting your own copy. I can provide the PDF, but since the text is so long it can be difficult to navigate and a bit slow.

Course Overview: A survey of dark-themed literature spanning from 429 B.C. to modern day where a number of texts (poems, short stories, plays) will be read, analyzed and discussed. Through our examination of dark fiction, we will better comprehend the ugly yet compelling side of human nature, the duality of characters, and the reflection of these traits and lessons in our own realities.

TYPES OF ASSIGNMENTS

- 1) Discussion Boards (DB): A low-stakes assignment in which you will respond to a prompt as well as respond to two classmates. The tone of DB assignments is less formal, and meant to promote classroom engagement. If you fulfill all the objectives of a DB, you will receive a completion grade.
- 2) Weekly Writing Reflections (WWR): A higher-stakes, short essay assignment in which you will respond to a prompt by submitting either a Word Doc or a Google Doc. You will organize your essay in MLA format with a proper heading and title. When necessary, you will have a Works Cited page. WWRs will be approximately 250 words (one page double-spaced), and are graded in increments of five: 100, 95, 90, 85, etc.

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is not tolerated in this class in any way, and that includes using online sources without proper citation, using a friend's paper, having someone write it for you, AI, etc. I run all essays through Turnitin, so best to be safe instead of sorry. Not to mention that most essays written by AI are weird, and sound like you copied a human and then made another copy. Don't do it, because if you do then you risk being reported and that leads to consequences which can lead to suspension which makes me sad, and you sad, and then what are we doing? I want to hear what YOU think - YOUR opinions, your ideas, your amazing interpretation of the texts. So let's save time and heartache and just write our own papers, okay? :)
