Course description and objectives:

This course focuses on the French phonetic system (International Phonetic Alphabet and French prosody) and pronunciation practice. Through in-class discussions, group activities, and homework exercises, students will have to opportunity to engage in various communicative tasks to enhance their pronunciation in authentic and meaningful contexts. They will be introduced to technical vocabulary to describe the sound system and other linguistic dimensions of French language from around the world.

Attendance

Class attendance is mandatory. Missing class--or part(s) of class repeatedly (more than 3 times) arriving late/leaving earlier—will result in loss of points in the attendance category. Students will be allowed two (2) unexcused absences during the semester, after which attendance grade will decrease with each unexcused absences. Students will automatically be dropped from the class with a grade of WF after eight (8) unexcused absences.

Authorized absences as listed in the UNT policies will be excused and will not affect students grade as long as students contact the instructor with appropriate documentation immediately upon their return and complete any missed/make-up assignments. Oral performance, Participation & Preparation

Every week, students will be graded on the following (5 pts for each class day):

- **active participation**: student volunteers to answer questions, provides answers to exercises, facilitates group discussion or pairwork, keeps group on task, etc.
- **preparation**: student reads the material before coming to class (student must read the Introduction section of each chapter before every Tuesday class!) and completes the homework assignments on a regular basis, including listen to audio and videos when assigned.
- **cooperative behavior**: student pays attention, displays positivity, leads, supports and mediates during group/pair activities.
- **oral performance**: tying in with the first two categories, students will also be assessed on the quality of their oral production and progress throughout the semester. Since this is a pronunciation course, students are expected to practice at home and be willing to work on their oral production in class.

Written work

In addition to reading the materials, students will have to complete homework activities on a regular basis. Homework assignments will be posted on Canvas from one class to the next. Students must complete the exercises on paper as they may be collected in class and graded. If graded, the assignments will appear as a category on Canvas after the grades have been entered. It is the student's responsible to check the Modules on Canvas to see if homework has been assigned.

Instructor may also assign activities from other sources (podcast or video transcriptions, etc.). Homework may include a listening component. Students should have access to a device that they can play their DVD-rom on and play audio or videos. Please check the UNT computer lab schedule if you need to make plans to access to a computer.

This category also includes any in-class activities (such as shorts quizzes or textbook exercises) that the instructor may want to grade.

Recordings

Students will have to submit several recordings during the semester, based on materials covered in class. Instructor will post information on Canvas and students will have to upload their recordings directly in the Canvas assignment box.

Exams

There will be three exams (including the final exam) of similar lengths based on the material covered previously.
