COURSE DESCRIPTION: Exploration of design process, product development, market research and production of fashion accessories.

Prerequisites: ART 1440, ART1450

COURSE OBJECTIVES LEARNING OUTCOMES: Upon successful completion of this course, the student will have had the opportunity to:

- 1. Recognize terminology used to describe accessory design features
- 2. Identify the accessory design and production process
- 3. Apply two and three-dimensional design principles to original designs
- 4. Incorporate consumer research and trend information into the product development process
- 5. Develop individual portfolio containing original design work, photographs, and digital images

COURSE STRUCTURE: This course will be a combination of lecture and lab with a flexible schedule.

STUDENT EVALUATION (OR GRADING): Your grade will be based upon the percentage of total points that the student accumulates from assigned activities/exams. Specific grading criteria for each project and assignment will be provided with the project instructions. In general, grading considerations will be given to:

- understanding of concepts presented and discussed in class
- thoughtful, critical use and evaluation of materials and sources of evidence
- organization and clarity of completed assignments
- thoroughness and following instructions for completing each project
