Course Description

• Psychology of the Offender 3530 is a course examining psychological knowledge, phenomenon, and theories that are pertinent to the offender and the legal system. Emphasis on how human characteristics and psychological factors influence attitudes, decisions, and behavior throughout the legal process. You will be exposed to guest speakers, directed readings from your textbook and real case studies, videos, simulations, and engaging lecture material. I hope you find this introduction to the as engaging as possible! Be aware that this course covers violent topics such as child molestation, sexual assault, homicide, mass shootings, and police brutality. Review the course calendar to see the topic for each week. If you are unable to engage with any of these topics, I kindly request that you do what's best for your wellness and drop this course. Students who stay enrolled are expected to

engage with the material each week and complete assessments that demonstrate understanding and application.

ASSESSMENTS AND GRADING

All assignments are due by the end of class on the scheduled calendar day with the exception of Exams.

Activities

Individual activities will be provided via Canvas as either case studies that you complete as an individual or as a group discussion board. They are intended to provide you with insight about your own unique perspectives toward the criminal justice system and expose you to the opinions of others.

Discussion boards will have two different due dates, each with their own points. Pay close attention to those due dates, and program them into your personal calendar. The Oops Pass (explained below) can only be used to extend the due date for one of the deadlines in a discussion board. For example, if you forgot to do an entire discussion board, you can use your one-time Oops Pass to extend the due date for the first part of that activity.

ACES Certification

The Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES) Certificate is an online training that you can complete at your own pace. The due date is listed in the syllabus calendar.

Many victims are children who eventually become adults. These adults may or may not become offenders, so it is important we cultivate a better understanding of what happened to people that contributed to their behaviors, thoughts, and emotions. Cultivating a better understanding also helps us to be more empathetic to those who have experienced trauma. An ACES Certification is a great addition to any resume for employment that involves law enforcement, therapy, health care, teaching, non-profit leadership, rehabilitation, corrections, education, and many more.

Exams & Quizzes

There will be individual tests, individual reading quizzes, and team activities during the course of the semester. The exams and quizzes will be handled on Canvas. Individual tests and quizzes will be based on lecture material, guest speakers, film, and assigned readings.

Exams

You are required to take 3 exams. These exams will be taken on Canvas. Exams will consist of approximately 55 multiple choice questions, each worth 2 points. The exam will be counted out of a possible 100 points, but you can score more than 100 points. In other words, each test will have at least 10 bonus points available. You should expect most of the questions to be "application." That is, most questions will have an example of a concept, and ask you to identify the example (in contrast to having you identify a definition.) You will have 1 hour and 15 minutes to take each exam. Most students will not need the entire time. Questions will appear one-at-a-time, with only forward progression allowed, so you must answer the question on the screen as it is presented. Exams are due by 11:59 PM CST on the date listed in the Course Calendar.

Missed Exam

If you miss, fail, or simply don't like a grade on an exam, you can take the **Optional Cumulative Final** during Final's Week. The final will replace your lowest exam grade ONLY IF the final exam grade is higher than your lowest grade. If it is not higher than your lowest exam grade, then the final exam grade will be ignored. Exams are open book and notes. They are NOT open Internet, and any student caught cheating will be subject to the Professional Conduct Policy described below. I highly recommend that you **NOT use your phone or tablet to take an exam**.

Reading Quizzes

Reading Quizzes are individual assignments, and will cover the materials specified in this syllabus. Each quiz is worth 10 points and may be taken from home. I highly recommend that you **NOT use your phone or tablet to take a quiz**. The Canvas app frequently fails, so if you think you can successfully take a quiz while away from a computer, you have been warned.

- Quizzes will have a time limit, so completing the quiz while looking up the answers for every question will be impossible.
- I highly suggest that you read the assigned pages for the designated quiz before you take it. The quizzes can be accessed by clicking on the "Quizzes" link in the Canvas menu. From there, a list of available quizzes will appear. Simply click on the Reading Quiz you want to take. There are two possible attempts for quizzes. If you choose to take the second attempt, your two quiz scores will be averaged for a final quiz grade.

- If you are unhappy with your performance on a quiz, there is hope! There are more quizzes available than required. Thus, if you miss or fail a quiz, don't worry! You have an additional opportunity to help your grade.
- Once the due date has passed for the quiz, it will be removed from Canvas. I will not allow any student to take a late quiz! Therefore, be mindful of the quiz due dates located in your syllabus.
- To give you some experience in taking quizzes on Canvas, you may take a Practice Quiz. The Practice Quiz will be set up just like a Reading Quiz on Canvas. You can take the Practice Quiz from any computer. To access this quiz, Click Practice Quiz. When the quiz appears, you will have directions to follow. You may take the quiz as many times as you want. It does NOT COUNT for a grade. All quiz scores will be removed.

Grade Disputes

You have 7 days to dispute a graded assignment from the time it has been entered into Canvas. Once 7 days have passed, the dispute resolution window has closed. Therefore, if I accidentally missed one of your assignments, or did not enter the right grade, or you feel like you provided a response that should get you more points, tell me within 7 days so I can fix it!

CLASS PARTICIPATION AND STUDENT CONDUCT

I will make class an intellectually stimulating and enjoyable experience. Students who ask questions and participate learn more, understand more, and have more fun than students who do not participate in class. In addition, your peers will assess your team performance at the end of the semester. This peer assessment will be a portion of your grade and impact the percentage of points you can earn for the final project.

Professional Conduct is REQUIRED

- Cheating: I will not tolerate dishonesty. All students are expected to complete assignments on their own. If you are caught cheating, you will receive an automatic zero for the assignment and be reported to the Dean of Students.

The Oops Pass

We all make mistakes. I certainly do. There will be days when you have so much going on that you completely space an assignment or put the wrong due date in your calendar. For those moments there's the Oops Pass. An Oops Pass provides students with the opportunity to submit ONLY ONE assignment 48 hours later than the due date with a 10% reduction in points. - No more than 20% of Al-generated information is allowed in any assignment.

You are responsible for the integrity and correctness of what you submit in your assignments. All is known to fabricate information and sources, so use All with caution as any information present in your work is your responsibility.

Attendance, Illness, Withdrawal, and Incomplete Coursework

The last day to withdraw from this course with a grade of W is April 5th, 2024. If you miss more than three weeks of class, you need to schedule a meeting with me to discuss steps to take to withdraw from the course or receive an <u>Incomplete grade</u>. A grade of Incomplete is only an option if you meet <u>university and</u>

departmental guidelines, including the completion of at least 60% of the course assignments and performance equivalent to a C or better when the Incomplete is requested. A grade of Incomplete is not to be used to extend due dates to help boost your current grade, serve as an alternative to a Course Withdrawal, or to provide additional time to complete coursework that you could have completed with proper time management. If you do not meet the requirements for an Incomplete grade, you may meet the requirements for a Late Course Withdrawal due to medical or personal reasons beyond your control. However, you must speak with me or the Dean of Students about an Incomplete or Late Course Withdrawal no later than the first Monday of the week before finals. For example, if finals begin on Monday, May 6th, discussions pertaining to Incomplete Grades or Late Course Withdrawal must occur by Monday, April 30th.
