# **Course Description**

This course is an introduction to political behavior and public policy in the United States and Texas. As you begin this course you should keep in mind two things. First, government matters to you. Regardless of your age, citizenship, race, religion, or gender, government policy affects the things you care about. Even if you are only taking this class because it is required, the material we will cover has real-world implications for your life, and mastering this material can give you the tools to protect the things you value, and have a better understanding of the world around you. Second, our actions as individuals and in groups are what form the political landscape. This course will explore the connection that is between the will of the people and those policies that are implemented by government by emphasizing how our political values and attitudes as individuals are the driving mechanism that connects government action (parties, interest groups, the media, and elections), and the outcomes of government policy. This is a course on action, which for political scientists is known as "political behavior," or how the "actions" of individuals and groups comes together to form the political landscape.

# **Course Objectives**

By taking this course, you should be able to:

- Understand the origins, development, and effects of US and Texas political culture
- Identify, describe, and explain the origin of individual political attitudes
- Demonstrate knowledge about the role and effects of the media on political behavior
- Assess the role of forms of political participation other than voting
- Understand what interest groups are, how they form and the effect they have on American politics
- Understand how elections, voting and participation interact in the Texas political arena
- Understand the relationship between money and elections
- Recognize the stage of the policy making process in different context
- Critique and explain select topics of U.S. domestic/foreign policy

Throughout the semester I will also communicate with the class using canvas messages and announcements. Therefore, it is important to regularly check canvas. My office hours are listed on the top of the syllabus, but you are more than welcome to come in anytime my door is open. I am also available by appointment or over zoom if my office hours conflict with your schedule. I am excited to get to know you this semester.

# **Grades and Assignments**

Grading will follow a standard scale: 90% is an A, 80% is a B, 70% is a C and 60% is a D. There are 4 groups of assignments: exams, workbook, Texas Tribune Quizzes, and the syllabus quiz. Each of these will factor into your final grade as follows:

Exams: 50% Workbook: 25%

Texas Tribune Quizzes: 20%

Syllabus Quiz: 5%

#### **Exams:**

There will be 2 exams in this course, each is worth a total of 25% of your grade. They will consist of 50 questions, a mix of multiple choice and true/false questions. They will cover content covered in class, as well as the webtext. The exams are NOT cumulative, all material covered before the first exam will be on exam 1, and all material after will be on exam 2. All exams will be in class on the days listed on the schedule. I will provide scantrons but you need to bring a pencil on exam days. If you need extra time or any other ODA accommodations, you are responsible for setting that up with ODA, and letting me know how about your accommodations. This will be no issue; I just need to know ahead of time! There is no final exam for this course.

Makeup exams will only be given in light of a university excused absence or at the instructors discretion. Students are expected to inform me of your absence before or within 48 hours after the examination date. I need specific documentation to verify the legitimacy of your absence. I will use that information to determine if you are eligible and we will schedule a time for the makeup. Makeup exams consist of one essay question that you will have 80 minutes to complete.

### **Soomo Webtext and Workbook Assignments:**

There are 8 workbook assignments from the online textbook, and they are worth 25% of your final grade. The workbook assignments consists of multiple choice questions throughout the chapter, and a quiz at the end. You will have 3 attempts to get the correct answer on the multiple choice questions throughout the workbook chapter, so please do not lose those easy points! However, you only have 2 attempts on the quiz at the end of each workbook chapter. There are 2 official due dates for the workbook assignments. The first four (Public Opinion, Political Participation, Political Parties and Elections and campaigns) are due on the Sunday before the first test at 11:59 pm. The second set (Mass Media, Interest Groups, Domestic Policy, and Foreign Policy) are due the Sunday before Thanksgiving Break at 11:59 pm. There are recommended due dates on the course schedule, and I recommend that you complete the assignments as we progress through the semester rather than wait until the due date. However, you will not be penalized if you do not complete the chapter by the recommended due dates. At the end of the semester the lowest workbook grade will be dropped from your final grade.

The workbooks and webtext chapters are both in the online textbook but only the questions in the workbook are for a grade! However, you do need to read the assigned webtext chapters as well (listed in the course schedule) because **some test questions will cover material from these chapters.** 

### **Texas Tribune Quizzes:**

To understand the political system and current events in Texas, we read the Texas Tribune, which is free online. I will send out a link to a Texas Tribune articles along with some points or questions to get you thinking about the article through the Canvas messaging system at the beginning of each week. There will not be an article sent out on the week of the Texas Tribune quiz or an exam. There are 3 Texas Tribune quizzes in this class, and they make up 20% of your final grade. These quizzes are online through canvas, and you will have 20 minutes to answer 10 questions and 2 attempts per quiz. I take the highest score. The questions do come from a quiz bank so if you take the quiz a second time you are not guaranteed the same questions. The quizzes will open on Tuesday the week they are due and you have until the Sunday at 11:59 to complete them.

### **Syllabus Quiz:**

The course syllabus contain information vital to your success in this class, and to encourage you to learn it, your first assignment is a syllabus quiz with 10 questions. You will take this quiz through canvas and you have two attempts (20 minutes each) to get the correct answers. This quiz is due at the end of the second week of classes but is available to you after the first day of class. It is worth 5% of your final grade.

#### Extra Credit:

Attendance and iClicker: Attendance is not required for this class, however it is strongly recommended as coming to class typically result in higher grades. Skipping class can also easily become a habit that spills over into other classes, and is really hard to break. While not for an official grade, this course uses iClicker to check for comprehension and encourage dynamic interaction in class. Throughout the lecture I include questions and polls and you answer through the iClicker app on your phone. This is a free app and UNT provides a license for each student as long as you sign up with your student email. I use participation in iClicker to occasionally check attendance and engagement and award extra credit that will apply to the exams. You have to be in class to participate and receive extra credit for iClicker.

**Investigations**: Investigations are activities embedded in the webtext chapters. They are not for an official grade, but you can **complete up to 6 investigations for extra credit on the exams** (3 investigations for each exam). To receive extra credit the investigations need to be completed by the workbook due date for the corresponding exam. For example, any of the investigations in the chapters covered

### **Technology in Class:**

You will need a device, such as a smart phone, to participate in iClicker questions, and if you are concerned about this please come and see me as soon as possible. Laptops and tablets are allowed in class to take notes, although I do not recommend you use them. Growing evidence indicates that taking notes by hand improves retention of materials and their understanding. The use of laptops and tablets often leads to checking email and social media or browsing the internet. They may also distract from in-class discussion. If I find that devices become a distraction, I retain the right to ban them in class.

## **Civility in Class:**

Politics is often characterized by conflict. I do encourage students to participate in class discussions and express their opinions. However, I expect students to treat each other with tolerance and respect.

#### **Academic Misconduct:**
