Course Description

This course provides an overview of the major aspects of modern English grammar from a linguistic perspective and examines how grammatical concepts can be introduced and reinforced to learners. While all topics and examples are pulled from English, the content of this course is applicable to language in general. So, no matter which language you want to teach, the tools of language analysis and language teaching you learn here will be of help. This includes major world languages, minority languages, indigenous languages, and other language varieties.

Learning Objective and Outcomes

We will cover major aspects of modern English grammar from a linguistic perspective as well as pedagogical methods and best practices for language instruction. After completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify and explain the basic structural components of English grammar.
- Identify common problems in the teaching and learning of English grammar.
- Demonstrate appropriate techniques, methods, and best practices in teaching English grammar.

Course Requirements

Course structure and management

Since this course is 100% online and asynchronous, I recommend accessing the Canvas course <u>daily</u>. Check the schedule, announcements, and discussion boards every time you log in to Canvas for information about discussions, assignments, and meetings.

This course is broken down into weekly lessons, each focusing on 1-2 major grammatical aspects in the English language. The lessons will introduce the concept meta-linguistically and then give examples on common classroom strategies to explain and reinforce the concept. Each lesson will include discussions and/or small activities to practice the content covered.

Throughout this course, we will work in groups and as a whole class. In order to do so harmoniously, we must be respectful of one another. In your discussions and other virtual interactions with fellow students, please refrain from using insulting or derogatory language. If I identify a problem, I'll give one warning. After that, I'll refer students to the department that deals with disciplinary issues. My goal is that we create a forum in which we can all learn from each other and flourish; respect and trust are key elements in achieving this.

I. Weekly Lesson Assignments

Each week's lesson will feature short assignments to reinforce topics learned. These assignments will be due at the end of the week for that lesson. These may be assignments you turn in through Canvas or assignments you post to discussions. The activity instructions will specify how to submit the assignment.

II. Participation in Online Discussions

Participation in this course will include online discussions and lessons for each week's topic. The discussions may cover the week's readings or be online exercises that you will post to a board for peer review. You must respond to two (2) of your peers per discussion in order to get full credit.

Discussion participation is a critical factor for your success in this course and I will keep track of yours. Since discussions are worth 20% of your course grade, I encourage you to contribute thoughtful comments and questions to interact as much as possible with your professor and your classmates.

III. Teaching Preparation Summaries

Three times over the semester, you will write 4-6 pages on some fact about English grammar (example: article usage). This write-up will be a method to help you prepare

for the integration of this grammar point in your ESL teaching. Topics will be assigned. I will also provide a grading rubric and sample answer.

IV. Paper on an English Grammar Topic

You will work individually or with a partner to conduct research on an assigned topic on English grammar. You will decide how to research the topic and which article(s) you will read. The most important part of this activity will be your discussion about the articles you've read. You will then create a summary of your discussion. Make sure this is not just a review of the papers you've read. Integrate your findings. If working in a team, you may collaborate to research your assigned grammar topic and summarize the findings, however each student must write up their paper in their own words and submit it individually.

Course Policies
