Course Description

Calculus I is the study of limits and continuity, derivatives, and integrals. The class will cover differentiation and integration of polynomial, rational, trigonometric, and algebraic functions as well as applications, including slope, velocity, extrema, area, volume, and work, and will provide preparation for students in STEM majors.

Course Prerequisites or Other Restrictions

- Officially, the prerequisite is a grade of C or higher in MATH 1650; or grade of C or higher in both MATH 1600 and MATH 1610.
- A willingness to put in several hours of work every day to absorb each the material in each module. In math courses, especially this one, the content will build upon itself making it exceedingly difficult to catch up if you fall behind.

Course Structure -INET

This course takes place 100% asynchronously online. For information on how to be successful in a remote learning environment, see: UNT Online (https://online.unt.edu/learn). Except for Zoom office hours, your interactions with me and your fellow students will take place in Canvas.

The course begins with the first content module in Canvas open. I will open subsequent modules about one week before it begins.

In the content modules, you will find lecture notes templates that correspond to instructional videos. The videos will go over content and show examples. Print the fillable lecture notes shells, in the space provided in the notes you should work through the examples with the aid of the videos. This is how you "attend class." Completing the notes is the first step to your learning success.

Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, learners will be able to:

- Develop solutions for tangent and area problems using the concepts of limits, derivatives, and integrals;
- Create graphs of functions considering limits, continuity, and differentiability at a point;
- Determine whether a function is continuous and/or differentiable at a point using limits;
- Use differentiation rules to differentiate functions;
- Identify appropriate calculus concepts and techniques to provide mathematical modules of real-world situations and determine solutions to applied problems;

- Evaluate definite integrals using the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus;
- Articulate the relationship between derivatives and integrals using the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus;
- Determine the area between curves using integration techniques;
- Determine the volume generated by rotating a curve about an axis; and
- Compute the average value of a function by integration.

Course Materials/ Required Text – Access to WebAssign

The textbook is Stewart, James, Clegg, Daniel, and Watson, Saleem Calculus, 9th Edition, Cengage Learning (2021). It is available online through WebAssign platform.

Cengage WebAssign: WebAssign is an online course delivery platform accessed directly through Canvas. WebAssign access includes all online homework assignments, the e-text of Calculus 9th Edition, and additional learning resources. Use the link in Canvas to register immediately. You must register in WebAssign by the 2nd class day of the semester, failure to do so may forfeit your access to the temporary trial access. See WebAssign Student Information.

WebAssign grants a no-cost trial 14-day access. You must purchase your access before the temporary access expires. If you do not make the purchase before the trial period ends, you may lose credit for all work previously completed. Again, see WebAssign Student Information for purchase information. Use your official UNT roster name when you register in WebAssign. I cannot give credit to a student enrolled in this course for work completed under a different name.

Grading

Your course grade is determined solely by your performance on the graded items. Expect no extra credit, or curves. Your course grade reflects your proficiency of the course content.

Letter Grades:

- A: 90-100% (Outstanding, excellent work. The student performs well above the minimum criteria.)
- B: 80-89% (Good, impressive work. The student performs above the minimum criteria.)
- C: 70-79% (Solid, college-level work. The student meets the criteria of the assignment.)
- D: 60-69% (Below average work. The student fails to meet the minimum criteria.)
- F: 59 and below (Sub-par work. The student fails to complete the assignment.) Grades will be posted in Canvas Grades. You are expected to keep track of your grades and current performance in class.

Homework (WebAssign) – You Learn by Practice!

Your WebAssign homework is found on the WebAssign website (link provided on Canvas). You have five (5) attempts per problem-type for each online problem in WebAssign. At the end of the term, your two (2) lowest WebAssign homework scores will be dropped.

Calculus Readiness/Prerequisite Diagnostic

You will need to complete a somewhat lengthy Precalculus review assignment. It is the Calculus Readiness Diagnostic assignment in WebAssign. This assignment goes over the main topics from Precalculus to make sure that you are prepared for this class. You have 100 attempts on each question, so you have ample opportunity (though not ample time) to review, revisit, refresh, and if needed, relearn key prerequisite material. Because this assignment is all prerequisite content, you should complete this the first day of class. This assignment is 5% of your course grade.

Quizzes

You have weekly guizzes in Canvas. The guizzes require Respondus Lockdown Monitor and a WebCam to ensure academic integrity. Exams and guizzes may be taken on desktop or laptop computers. IPads are not allowed for exams or quizzes. You should complete the homework before you attempt the quiz. The quizzes are timed and must be completed in one setting. The problems on each quiz will come from homework assignments, either written or WebAssign. No make-up quizzes will be given. To account for not allowing make-up guizzes, the lowest two (2) guiz scores will be dropped.

Engagement Tasks

Engagement tasks are orientation assignments and discussion posts. The discussion assignments are intended to replicate classroom conversation and to connect you with your classmates.

Early Exam

If you have a conflict with a scheduled exam date, you may request to take your exam early. The request must be sent to Canvas Inbox one week prior to the scheduled exam date.

Exam Protocol

- Exams may be taken on desktop or laptop computers. IPads are not allowed for exams.

- Clear your test-taking environment.
- No phones or *any* electronic messaging devices. This includes smart watches.
- Once opened you have 60 minutes (midterm exams) and 120 minutes (Final Exam) to complete the exam.
- Show clean desk surface to webcam.

- Do not open the exam unless you are prepared to work, and your technology is ready, and in working order.
- Extra time nor re-do's will not be granted to account for technical difficulties and work will not be accepted through email.
- You will be required to complete the problems on your own paper and show your work to the webcam screen. NO VALID WORK, NO CREDIT, NO EXCEPTIONS.
- No noise or watching TV during any exams. Failure to comply with all exam protocols will result in a zero for that exam.

You will be able to see your exam grade in Canvas about 1 week after the exam. You may ask me to go over exam problems with you. However, all decisions on credit are final and not open for discussion.

Exams and Make-up Policy

If you miss an exam for any reason (i.e. emergency, illness, technology issues, no wifi, no internet, have to work, have to travel, are out-of-town, etc.), you may have a 1-day extension on an exam with a 30% penalty. The exam must be completed within a day from the due date. Thus, 30% will be deducted from your official exam score. Requires Instructor approval before the due date. If the exam is not taken within a day after the due date, unfortunately a zero will be recorded for that exam. Please plan accordingly. See calendar for all exam due dates.

Federal Regulation

To read detailed Immigration and Customs Enforcement regulations for F-1 students taking online courses, please go to the <u>Electronic Code of Federal Regulations website</u> (http://www.ecfr.gov/). The specific portion concerning distance education courses is located at Title 8 CFR 214.2 Paragraph (f)(6)(i)(G).

The paragraph reads:

(G) For F-1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken on-line or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination, or other purposes integral to completion of the class. An on-line or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F-1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no on-line or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experience integral to the completion of this course.

If such an on-campus activity is required, it is the student's responsibility to do the following:

(1) Submit a written request to the instructor for an on-campus experiential component within one week of the start of the course.

Transmission and Recording of Student Images in Electronically-Delivered Courses
