The grade/credit for each chapter's online exercises will be given every Monday following the week when each chapter was covered in class. For example, we will cover the chapitre préliminaire during Week 1, so on Monday of Week 2, I will give you credit for the chapitre préliminaire online exercises (if you have completed a majority of them—and you just need to try a few questions/items in each exercises in order to get credit).
