Course Description, Structure, and Objectives

Analysis and exploration of language and other aspects of society in the francophone world, including former colonies of France and countries where French is used as a national, official or regional language.

This is an Internet course with 5 modules, each of which lasts 3 weeks.

Assignments are always due on a Friday, and the weekend is used for automatic due date extensions. The final module of this course is for a research project, which is the only assignment for the module.

Detailed learning objectives for each module are provided in Canvas.

The overarching objectives are provided below:

- 1) Identify key dates, events, products, services, and people who had (or currently have) an important role in developing cultural, linguistic, and political aspects of life in the city of Paris.
- 2) Explain cultural and social issues that are affecting—in different ways—current events in the city of Paris and, by extension, in the greater Paris region and/or throughout France.
- 3) Analyze the role of language in Paris within the context of France and Europe.
- 4) Evaluate language-related legislation in Paris/France/Europe.
