SYLLABUS – FREN 5150 Research Project Seminar in French Course Topic: Data-Driven Learning, Spring 2023

This syllabus was revised on February 27, 2023.

The schedule for weeks 8-15 was adjusted because several dates were incorrect.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Within a framework of data-driven learning and teaching, students engage in research related to foreign language curriculum, instruction, or assessment through project design, literature review, data collection, data analysis, and presentation of results. The final project is a research report in the format of a journal article.

Prerequisite(s): Enrollment in the M.A. French program or department approval.

May be repeated for credit as topics vary.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The learning opportunities provided in this course will help you to do the following:

- find and evaluate resources for conducting research on a specific topic;
- synthesize and organize information in English and French;
- collect and analyze data related to teaching French as a foreign language; and
- present information in French through different modes of communication.

You may work on the research project individually or in a group of 2. In order for you to work in a group of 2, you must schedule a consultation with the instructor during Week 1 or Week 2 of the semester so that I can provide you with specific details associated with working as a team.

During the Spring 2023 semester, there may be a total of only 3 students in this course. If this is the CASE, IT MIGHT BE POSSIBLE FOR EVERYONE TO WORK TOGETHER. WE CAN DISCUSS THIS AS A GROUP.

Project Proposal [50 points]

- This will be due at the end of Week 3 of the semester.
- Students will give informal presentations during the regularly scheduled class period during Week 3 in order to share their projects with the entire class. This will require you to begin practicing how to explain your project in a condensed way to other people.
- The main focus of your written proposal must be the design of the study.
- You must include at least one main (overarching) research question.
- You must include a list of a minimum of 5 journal articles that you have already decided to include in your literature review. This list must follow the style guidelines of the American Psychological Association (the most widely used guidelines for projects in any area of Applied Linguistics).
- Guidelines and an evaluation rubric for the written proposal are provided in Canvas. Since the informal presentation is not graded, there is no evaluation for this component of the research project.

Literature Review [50 points]

 By the end of Week 6 of the semester, you need to demonstrate that you have read 5 of the 10 (total) research articles (from journals that publish peer-reviewed research) that are required for this project. During the remainder of the semester, you must read and summarize at least 5 additional research articles that will be included in your final (written) version of the research project.

- Students will give informal presentations during the regularly scheduled class period during Week 6 in order to share the highlights of their literature review with the entire class.
- Guidelines and an evaluation rubric are provided in Canvas.

Data Set [50 points]

- Since this part of the research project will be due at the end of Week 9 of the semester, you must collect some data during Weeks 7-9.
- Students will give informal presentations during the regularly scheduled class period during Week 9 in order to explain their data set/corpus to the entire class.
- Since this course focuses on survey-driven research, your main source of data for this project must come from a survey that you developed based on the required readings, classroom discussions, and consultations with the professor.
- Guidelines and an evaluation rubric are provided in Canvas.

Data Analysis [50 points]

- You are not required to submit a formal draft of your data analysis at the end of Week 12.
 However, you are required to meet at least once with the instructor during the regularly scheduled class period during Weeks 10-12 in order to explain what you have found in your data and to ask questions about your data.
- Guidelines and an evaluation rubric are provided in Canvas.

Oral Presentation of Data [100 points]

- The main focus of your in-class presentation during Week 14 must be data analysis.
- Guidelines and an evaluation rubric are provided in Canvas.

Research Project [200 points]

- The written version of the research project will be due during the week of final exams on the date when you normally would have had a final exam. This final project replaces the final exam.
- Guidelines and an evaluation rubric are provided in Canvas.

Appendix A Typing International Characters

There are many resources on line that explain how to type letters that include symbols that are not used in English. A few of these resources have been provided below for your convenience; however, you may prefer to use different online resources, and that is your choice.

In the field of Linguistics, international characters are called diacritics, even though people often refer to them as *accents* or *accent marks*. French diacritics include 3 accents and 2 other symbols.

FRENCH DIACRITICS

è	grave accent	<u>l'accent grave</u>
ê	circumflex accent	<u>l'accent circonflexe</u>
ë	diaeresis	<u>le tréma</u>
