Course description and objectives

This course is the second semester of a two-semester intermediate-level review of French. It is designed to expand and reinforce language proficiency and cultural knowledge. Since regular practice is essential for improving proficiency in a foreign language, attendance and active participation are necessary for your success in this course.

Eligibility

This course is for students who have completed 2040 or the equivalent. If you have studied French previously you can take the (free) placement test offered by the Department of World Languages, Literatures and Cultures. Depending on the results, you may be able to receive official credit for the course. Required Materials

- Bravo! 8th edition, 2015. Cengage. (Textbook and electronic workbook: ILearn). Muyskens, Harlow, Vialet, Briere. [Chapters 5-8 are covered in FREN 2050.]
 Make sure to purchase the **Student Edition** only. If you purchase the IAE (Instructor Annotated Edition), you will **also** be required to purchase the student edition.
- The textbook (hard copy or eBook) and electronic (online) workbook <u>ILearn</u> are required. Please note that the exercises in the electronic workbook are not submitted for a grade, but exercises from the electronic workbook will be taken directly (or modified slightly) for quizzes and exams, which is why the electronic workbook is required.

- The book key for the electronic workbook is usually bundled with the textbook when purchased at the University of North Texas bookstore.
- If you buy a (new or used) textbook elsewhere, it is your own responsibility to make sure the book key is bundled with the textbook. Otherwise, it is your responsibility to buy a separate book key for the electronic workbook (iLrn).
- In order to use the electronic workbook, you will need the instructions provided in Canvas (in the folder **Syllabus and Administrative Information**).

Use of Electronics in class

A note on Incompletes

I is a non-punitive grade given only during the last one-fourth of a term/semester and only if a student (1) is passing the course and (2) has justifiable and documented reason, beyond the control of the student (such as serious illness or military service), for not completing the work on schedule.
