COURSE DESCRIPTION

UNT course description: Principles of music performance using the band and/or orchestra ensemble. Foundations of performance on band and/or stringed instruments, rescoring and arranging for band and/or orchestra, fundamentals of marching band, performance practices, and standard band and/or orchestra literature. Prerequisite(s): MUED 3100 and MUED 3200. Must be a Music Education major.

As instrumental music teachers, our programs are often in the spotlight of public attention, opinion, and expectations. The combination of teaching, performing, and serving is a delicate "balancing act" that is often unique to music educators. Although the structure of programs may differ from school to school, instrumental music teaching in any setting invariably requires attention to musical, social, and organizational goals.

In this course, we will think critically about the nature of music, music instruction, and the role of school music participation in the lives of young people, particularly adolescents.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

1. Investigate organizational and support structures of school instrumental music programs
2. Review and evaluate literature appropriate for use in a variety of school ensembles
3. Practice teaching techniques applicable to the ensemble setting
4. Prepare instrumental scores for instructional contexts

As with many college-level courses (and for nearly every course that I teach), strengthening written communication skills writ large is an ever-present goal.

MATERIALS AND TECHNOLOGY

Canvas will be utilized on a limited basis. Email, basic word processing, accessing journal articles via online library resources, basic Canvas navigation and uploading assignments into Canvas modules.

Primary and/or secondary musical instruments. Conductor baton. Purchase of conductor score if needed.

Each assignment will be weighted as indicated above (see “Assignments and weighting”) to calculate the final course grade.

Assignments should be submitted when due (“DUE” on calendar). Assignments will be graded/returned by the end of the following week. Late work may receive limited instructor feedback and is subject to a maximum score of 4. Unless specified otherwise, assignments may be resubmitted for a higher score. Work must be submitted by the end of the course.

Attendance at all class meetings is expected. Three absences for any reason (aside from university-excused absences) will subject the course grade to being lowered by one full letter. Per Division of Music Education policy, more than three absences results in a failing grade for the course. End-of-semester juries must not be scheduled during class time; any such absences will not be excused.

For purposes of encouraging punctuality (or, more precisely, discouraging tardiness), three tardies shall be calculated as one absence. Concerns regarding punctuality, attendance, and any other matters of professionalism may affect Teacher Candidate status and Clinical Teaching eligibility.

Financial Aid and Satisfactory Academic Progress

Undergraduates

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total hours registered. Students cannot exceed attempted credit hours above 150% of their required degree plan. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.

Students holding music scholarships must maintain a minimum 2.5 overall cumulative GPA and 3.0 cumulative GPA in music courses.
