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Course Description

This is the second semester course of the intermediate level of Spanish in which students will continue to develop their proficiency in the four language skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Students will participate in listening comprehension activities, oral projects, in depth cultural study, readings, audio and video resources, as well as Web based language interaction. Students will both practice and interact through various online activities. Class will be conducted in Spanish and students are expected to use only Spanish in all assignments.

Pre-requisites

This course is designed for students who have passed Spanish 1010, 1020, and 2040 at UNT or the equivalent. For more information, please contact the Department of Spanish in LANG 101, 565-2404.

Course Objectives

At the end of this course students be able to:

- Express past events with more accuracy
- Analyze books, music, film, and entertainment of the Hispanic world
- Discuss topics related to work and finances
- Compare and contrast rural and urban life
- Analyze future plans and what will have happened by a specific point in time
- Analyze what would happen or would have happened under certain circumstances
- Express hypothetical situations as well as unplanned events
- Distinguish conditions that are results of an action from passive structures

Required Materials

Course Content

All the content of the course will be stored in in the main menu in Canvas. Study assignments are organized in 5 modules (one module for each week of class). Modules will cover chapters 6-10 in the textbook and includes specific information about readings and assignments for each week. It is your responsibility to consult the class schedule and meet the deadlines for all assignments. Work on assignments at your own pace but keep in mind that all weekly assignments have to be turned in before every Friday 5:00 pm. This is a fast course and it is highly recommended to work on assignments every day. Late work will not be accepted.

In order to enroll in the next level of Spanish, students need to pass this course with a final grade of C and above.

ACTIVE PARTICIPATION

The participation portion of your grade will be derived from the level and quality of your interaction with other students and your professor in the course. As active participation, and to practice your writing, reading, speaking and listening skills in Spanish, you will be required to complete <u>written and oral weekly discussions</u> in Canvas on specific topics related to the chapter of study.

Written Discussions: You will post a total of 3 written discussions during the course in a paragraph form on the topic assigned. After you post your discussion, you will read the posts of **two** students and you will give each of them a substantial written comment. You will be graded on grammar, sentence construction, topic and originality.

Oral Discussions: For oral discussions you will make a total of 2 videos (3-minutes each) during the course on the topic assigned and upload it in Canvas in the Discussions section. After you post your video discussion, you will watch the videos of **two** students and you will give each of them a substantial **2 minutes voice comment** using the voice recording button in Canvas. You will be graded on grammar, sentence construction, topic and originality. Do not read when recording your video or audios. Any read recordings will receive a grade of 0.

Full information is provided in Canvas. Discussions will be graded according to the rubric provided (for rules on plagiarism, see Academic Integrity course policies below).

Late work is not permitted.

QUIZZES: There is only one quiz in this course. This quiz is for a grade and it will evaluate your knowledge over the syllabus. It is important to read the syllabus completely before taking the quiz. You will have two attempts and you will receive the highest grade. To take the quiz you will need to download (one time) in your computer the application "LockDown Browser System" provided by UNT. The link to download the application and more information about the system is available in the correspondent folder in Canvas. Taking quiz 1 using LockDown will also serve as a practice before you take exams. Without the application you will not be able to open quiz 1 and exams. Late work is not permitted.

EARN EXTRA POINTS: VIDEO #3

Video 3 is optional for students who would like to earn 50 extra points in Participation and have already submitted videos 1 and 2. The topic, guidelines and grading rubric are available in Canvas in Module 5. Your video must be **3 minutes long** minimum. Shorter videos will not be accepted nor receive partial credit. You will upload your video in the correspondent place **in Canvas** before the due date. Do not read when recording your video. Any read recordings will receive a grade of 0. See instructions in Canvas Module 5. **Late work is not permitted.**

ONLINE HOMEWORK

IMPORTANT: (iLrn homework is 35 % of your final grade) Using iLrn (textbook website), you will be assigned a variety of online activities and Grammar videos to watch from both the textbook and the SAM (Student Activities Manual). Weekly homework is due every Friday before 5:00 pm. It is highly recommended to watch the grammar videos and do the homework every day and before taking exams. Late work is not allowed.

ALL EXAMS WILL BE USING THE LOCKDOWN BROWSER SYSTEM APPLICATION. You will need to upload the application in your computer in advance. For more information about this system

and the link to download the application in your computer, see the folder in Canvas. (Quiz 1 will give you some practice with LockDown System before taking the exams). Read all important requirements and expectations for taking exams in Canvas.

MIDTERM AND FINAL EXAM

These exams will evaluate your listening, reading, writing, vocabulary and grammatical skills. Midterm exam will cover chapters 6-7 of your textbook and Final exam will cover chapters 8-10. Midterm and Final exams can be taken at homeorin-the-Language-Lab (Lang building first floor, check the website for the schedule). Exam study guides and information is available in Canvas. Each exam will be available ONLY on the days and time assigned. Midterm and Finals exam will be timed, and you will have 2 hours to take each exam. If you take the exam in the Language lab, plan your time well and arrive at least two hours before the lab closes. Lab is closed Saturdays and Sundays. You will need to bring your UNT student ID and sign in and out at the front desk. Without ID students will not be able to take the exam. Make-ups for exams will not be allowed. For exams due dates consult the Class Schedule.

IMPORTANT NOTE ABOUT EXAMS:

- All chapter exams are <u>closed book</u>, <u>closed notes</u>, <u>closed resources</u>. Exams must be taken <u>alone</u> and no communication with other individuals is allowed. The usage of electronic translators is completely prohibited. As an UNT student, academic integrity and honesty are expected of you. Infringements on this policy will result in a grade of 0.
- Before taking exams and when prompted by the LockDown Browser System, students need to **complete and fully** show their environment to the webcam, including their desk or lap. Failure to do so will result in a grade of 0 for the exam without another opportunity to take it.
- Do not start any exam until you are ready to take it.
- The timer starts upon access and the exam will close when the time is over.
- Do not navigate away from or exit an online exam before hitting the submit button as this may lock you out of the exam and invalidate your score.
- Notify your professor immediately if you experience a technical issue with the system while taking an exam. Take a screen shot as a proof of the problem and send it to your professor if necessary.

- Take your exam as early as possible. In the event of a technical issue with your computer, you are able to solve it and take the exam before the deadline.
- Make sure your laptop computer is fully charged before beginning the exam. Make up for exams will not be allowed due to computer problems.

FINAL ORAL CONVERSATION

At end of the course you will have a short conversation in Spanish with your Professor using the "Conference" Video call feature in Canvas (for more information see the Module "Conversación Final" in Canvas). The conversation will cover the communicative functions practiced in class and will be based in topics related to the theme of some of the chapters covered during the course. The conversation will be for **4-5 minutes**. Each student will be graded on content and detail provided, incorporation of grammatical structures and vocabulary studied throughout the course, preparation and use of communication strategies. Students will sign up in advance (in Canvas Calendar) on the day and time that best fits their schedule. **For this assignment you will need a webcam in your computer** Grading rubric, topics, questions and guidelines are available in "Conversación Final" folder in Canvas. Consult the Class Schedule for the date. **Late assignments are not accepted**. Not showing up for this assignment will result in a grade of 0. If there is a conflict with the time slots available, contact your instructor immediately to reschedule.

Federal Regulation

The paragraph reads:

(G) For F–1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken on-line or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination or other purposes integral to completion of the class. An on-line or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F–1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no on-line or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experience integral to the completion of this course.

If such an on-campus activity is required, it is the student's responsibility to do the following:

- (1) Submit a written request to the instructor for an on-campus experiential component within one week of the start of the course.
