Course Description

Spanish 2050 online is a language course designed to bring students to an intermediate level of proficiency in the Spanish language. The course focuses on Spanish grammar and emphasizes in particular listening, speaking, reading and writing skills. Students will participate in listening comprehension activities, oral projects, in-depth cultural study, readings, audio and video resources, as well as Web-based language interaction. The class will be conducted in Spanish and students are expected to use only Spanish on all assignments.

Course Structure

All the content of the course is located in the main menu on Canvas. Study assignments are organized in weekly modules. Modules cover **chapters 15-18** in the textbook (*Puntos de Partida*, 11th Edition). Each module contains folders with quizzes, specific information, guidelines and grading rubrics for assignments. Exams, exam reviews, study guides and practice test are located in the last module of each chapter.

Reading and Assignments

Information about weekly readings, pages to study, and assignments are located in each weekly module in Canvas or in the Assignments Class Schedule document. It is the student responsibility to continually consult the assignments schedule and meet the due dates. Work on assignments at your own pace but keep in mind that **all weekly assignments have to be turned in every Friday 11:59 pm**. All assignments for the last week of class are due on Thursday. It is highly recommended to work on assignments every day. **Late work will not be accepted.**

Course Prerequisites or Other Restrictions

This course is designed for students who have passed Spanish 1010, 1020 and 2040 at UNT or the equivalent. Do not enroll in this course if you have not taken the pre-requisites. For more information, please contact the Department of Spanish in LANG 101, (940) 565-2404.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Analyze the different cultural aspects of the Hispanic world
2. Discuss topics related to natural and urban environments
3. Talk about relationships and stages of one's life
4. Express contingency and purpose in complex sentences using the subjunctive
5. Recall and describe past events using more complex sentences
6. Discuss about money, finances and job opportunities
7. Analyze situations related to diverse professions
8. Express probability using the future
9. Examine hypothetical events using the conditional
10. Discuss about government and civic responsibilities

on folder “How to Register in Connect or Buy the Access Code” and follow the instructions in the video. **Important: Canvas is the only place where you will be able to register.**

- When you buy the access code, you will also have access to the electronic textbook. It is up to you to buy the hard copy.
- Do not miss the first week of homework: if you need more time to buy the Connect access code, use the 3-week temporary access to register.

Rules of Engagement

- Avoid using “text-talk” unless explicitly permitted by your instructor.
- Proofread and fact-check your sources.
- Keep in mind that online posts can be permanent, so think first before you type.

Policy on Late Work

Late work will be accepted only in case of an emergency (illness/accident or death in family). The student should contact the instructor as soon as possible providing documentation supporting the need for any late submission of a graded assignment. In the case of an anticipated absence, such as military deployment, the student should contact the instructor in advance and make arrangements to complete the required assignments.

Grading

A = 90-100%, B = 80-89.4%, C = 70-79.4%, D = 60-69.4%, F = Below 60%

Grades will be rounded up to the next grade as follows: 89.5-89.9= 90, etc.

To be successful in the next level of Spanish, it is highly recommended that students pass this course with a final grade of C or above. A minimum grade of C is obligatory for all Spanish majors and minors.

Extra Credit

Students can earn extra points by doing the SPOT evaluation and quiz 11. The SPOT extra points will be counted towards exams. To receive the extra points for SPOT, the student must forward the instructor the confirmation email she/he receives from UNT after evaluating. Screenshots will not be accepted.

Connect Homework

You will be assigned a variety of online reading, cultural, Grammar videos and grammar assignments on Connect, the textbook electronic platform. Weekly assignments will be displayed on the main page. It is highly recommended to work on all assignments before taking quizzes and exams. Homework will be due every Friday 11:59 pm. **Late work is not accepted.** Using translators or outside help for written assignments will result in a grade of 0 without the opportunity to redo the work.

Writing Assignments

There will be 4 writing assignments throughout the semester to help you to further develop your writing and cognitive skills in Spanish. Instructions and topics can be found in Canvas. To receive a grade on writing assignments, **the student must write the essay written portion of each exam.** Your writing proficiency in writing assignments must be close to your writing in exams. Using translators or outside

help for written assignments will result in a grade of 0 without the opportunity to redo the work.

Speaking Assignments

Students will write create three video assignments throughout the semester. Video assignment # 3 will be in collaboration with a classmate. Students are responsible for contacting a collaborator well in advance. Each assignment will be uploaded in the drop box in Canvas. Speaking assignments will prepare students for the final debate that will take place in person in Zoom (or at the instructor's office) at the end of the semester. The purpose of these assignments is to evaluate your Spanish speaking skills. Reading the assignments will result in a lower grade. Topics, guidelines and grading rubric available in Canvas.

Activities that can replace 2 video speaking assignments

A maximum of **2 video speaking assignments** can be replaced by attending “**The Spanish Club at UNT**” (you must be a member to attend). You can attend as many sessions as you wish but only two video speaking assignments can be replaced. To receive full credit, the student must sign in at the event and actively participate. The Spanish Club offers a great opportunity to practice your Spanish speaking skills, interact with other students, expand your knowledge on the Hispanic culture through hands on activities, as well as do some volunteer work in the community (not obligatory). The Spanish Club activities for the semester will be posted by your instructor in Canvas as soon as they become available. A flyer with the schedule and activities will also be posted in several places around the LAN building.

Final Debate

On the last week of class, you will have a debate in Spanish with a classmate using the “Zoom” feature of Canvas or at the instructor's office. **Important: this is not a video assignment.** The debate will cover the communicative functions practiced in class and will be based in 4 topics related to the theme of the 4 chapters covered during the course. The debate will be for **6 minutes per pair or 9 minutes per group of three students**. This assignment will be graded **individually** on content and detail provided, incorporation of grammatical structures, and vocabulary studied throughout the course, preparation and use of communication strategies. Students will sign up in advance (on Canvas Calendar) on the day and time provided by the professor. Grading rubric, topics to study, and guidelines on how to do well on this assignment are available in the Module “Final Debate” on Canvas.

Debates will not be conducted on weekends. It is the student's responsibility to make the necessary arrangements to have the debate on the days schedule. If there is a conflict with the time, contact your instructor immediately to reschedule.

ODA students need to contact their professor during the first week of class if reasonable accommodations for this assignment is needed.

Lockdown Browser System

Quizzes and exams will be using LockDown Browser System. Instructions and the link to download the application in your computer is in “Where to get help” Module. To take quizzes and exams, you will need a webcam on your computer. If your computer does not have a webcam, you can take the exam in the Language Lab, the Library or other buildings in campus. Check their schedule or call them in advance. In Canvas, there is a practice quiz to familiarize yourself with LockDown Browser and learn how to record your environment correctly.

Quizzes

Throughout the semester there will be weekly quizzes assigned in **Canvas** (except for the week of exams). The practice quiz mentioned above will also help you to familiarize yourself with the exam format. **Quiz 1** will evaluate your knowledge on this syllabus and modules “Start Here”, “Course Information” and “Instructor Information”. You will have two attempts for quiz 1. Quizzes 2-10 will cover vocabulary, listening, and specific grammar concepts studied during the week of the quiz. **Quiz 11** is optional to receive extra credit (10 points maximum). Except for the practice quiz, all chapter quizzes are timed, and you will be allowed to take each only once.

Take your quiz and exams as soon as possible. In case of computer problems, you will need time to solve them before the exam/quiz closes. If you experience technical problems, contact the UNT Help Desk for help and request a case ticket number, then contact your professor to report the incident. Take a screenshot of the problem and email it to your professor. Make up for quizzes and exams will not be allowed due to computer problems.

Chapter exams

To evaluate your listening, reading, writing, vocabulary and grammatical skills, there will be **4 chapter** exams (chapters 15-18) throughout the semester. **Exam 4 will be your final exam** and it will be taken on the date scheduled by UNT for all online courses. Study guides and complete information with instructions on how to take the exams using LockDown Browser are available on Canvas.

Examination Policy

- Each exam will be available **ONLY** on the days and time assigned.
- All quizzes and exams will be timed, and students will be logged out once the time expires.
- All quizzes and exams must be taken **alone** and communication with other individuals **is not** allowed. **The usage of electronic translators is completely prohibited.** As a UNT student, academic integrity and honesty are expected. Infringements on this policy will result in a grade of 0.
- It is the student’s responsibility to read in full and follow all the rules and regulations before taking exams and quizzes. Rules are available in Canvas in folder “Rules and Regulations for Exams and Quizzes”. **Failure to follow the rules may result in a grade of 0 on your exam or quiz with no opportunity to retake it.**
- Make sure your laptop computer is fully charged before beginning any quiz or exam. **Make up for quizzes or exams will not be allowed due to computer problems.**

Course Evaluation

Important Notice for F-1 Students taking Distance Education Courses

Federal Regulation

To read detailed Immigration and Customs Enforcement regulations for F-1 students taking online courses, please go to the [Electronic Code of Federal Regulations website](#). The specific portion concerning distance education courses is located at Title 8 CFR 214.2 Paragraph (f)(6)(i)(G).

The paragraph reads:

(G) For F-1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken on-line or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination or other purposes integral to completion of the class. An on-line or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F-1 student's course

of study is in a language study program, no on-line or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experience integral to the completion of this course.

If such an on-campus activity is required, it is the student's responsibility to do the following:

(1) Submit a written request to the instructor for an on-campus experiential component within one week of the start of the course.

If the use of the work does not meet all of the above criteria, then the University office or department using the work must obtain the student's written permission. Download the UNT System Permission, Waiver and Release Form

Transmission and Recording of Student Images in Electronically Delivered Courses

1. No permission is needed from a student for his or her image or voice to be transmitted live via videoconference or streaming media, but all students should be informed when courses are to be conducted using either method of delivery.
2. In the event an instructor records student presentations, he or she must obtain permission from the student using a signed release in order to use the recording for future classes in accordance with the Use of Student-Created Work guidelines above.
3. Instructors who video-record their class lectures with the intention of re-using some or all of recordings for future class offerings must notify students on the course syllabus if students' images may appear on video. Instructors are also advised to provide accommodation for students who do not wish to appear in class recordings.

Example: This course employs lecture capture technology to record class sessions. Students may occasionally appear on video. The lecture recordings will be available to you for study purposes and may also be reused in future course offerings.

No notification is needed if only audio and slide capture is used or if the video only records the instructor's image. However, the instructor is encouraged to let students know the recordings will be available to them for study purposes.
