COURSE OVERVIEW: This course offers an overview of physiological psychology and is designed to prepare students for graduate school. The anatomy and physiology of the CNS will be discussed, as well as specific topics including (but not limited to) neurochemistry, neuropharmacology, the physiology of stress/psychoneuroimmunology, memory, and the biological basis of psychological disorders.

ASSIGNMENTS

- **Exams:** There are four handwritten exams that will be taken in person.
