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COURSE DESCRIPTION:

We will be doing an overview of Italian Cinema from post-WWII Neorealism to modern day. We will explore Italian culture, language and history through the cinematic lens using each film as a framework for discussion and examination. Different genres will be introduced and analyzed and certain filmmakers will be highlighted as we move chronologically through the decades. Class will be conducted in Italian and English.

You will be responsible for watching each required viewing on your own time outside of class. All of the films you can find on an online platform, many at no cost. *Kanopy* is a free online platform for university students. Having a *Prime* and *YouTube* subscription will help, as well. Many of the films you can stream for free through UNT's Chilton Media Library or you can reserve a physical copy of the DVD.

We will have a "free choice" week (*see syllabus*) in which you will be expected to have watched an Italian film of choice and you will share a brief (informal!) synopsis of the film. I will provide a handout with film suggestions within the first few weeks of the semester and each student will be expected to watch something different.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of this course, students will have

- ✓ experienced some major examples of Italian cinema,
- ✓ developed greater facility in analyzing the language and tropes of film,
- ✓ engaged with Italian popular discourse around the themes of youth, rebellion, and the South, drawing comparisons to that discourse in their own culture,
- ✓ increased their proficiency with the Italian language through conversation, writing, and oral presentation

GRADES AND POLICIES

Attendance: As with all language classes and since we only meet twice a week, attendance in ITAL 3050 is compulsory. Absences due to severe illness, family weddings and funerals, religious holidays, and official university events will be excused, provided that you can supply **appropriate documentation**. I would appreciate a physical copy of your document given to me in class. All other absences will be unexcused. Accumulating excessive unexcused absences will result in your grade being reduced according to the following scheme:

- ➤ 2 or fewer unexcused absences: No effect on final grade.
- ➤ 3-more unexcused absences: each absence results in 3% deduction of your attendance grade (3 absences= 97%; 4= 94%; 5= 91% and so on...)

Participation and preparedness: Your job in this course is to practice using Italian around the designated topics. This should involve some work every day outside of class: whether watching or re-watching the films, making notes, or preparing for presentations or written assignments. Each class meeting, then, will be an opportunity for you to demonstrate what you have been working on during the week, to share your thoughts and questions about the material, and to engage with the work of your classmates. It takes time to figure out how to articulate your thoughts in Italian! Give yourself enough time during the off days to make sense of what you want to say. In assessing your participation, I will be looking for **evidence of good preparation**.

Presentazioni (**presentations**): Each student will choose a presentation viewing and will present a PowerPoint presentation on the film with facts, summary, scene analysis and feedback **in Italian** (if there are some points in English, that is fine). Take time to research each film and a sign-up sheet will be circulated on **Wednesday**, **September 4** in class. If you are absent that day, you will be assigned a film. Along with the PowerPoint and presentation, you will turn in a 2 page typed analysis of the film in Italian. A summary of presentation expectations will be posted on Canvas within the first few weeks of class.

Free choice week: You will be expected to present to the class a synopsis of your Italian film of choice. You will present the plot, characters, analyze a scene and give us your opinions on various aspects of the film. This will count towards your "Quizzes/Homework" average. Although it is informal and will not be expected to turn anything in, you will be graded on preparedness and you may prepare a (brief) PowerPoint, if you choose.

Prove (quizzes): Periodically throughout the semester short online quizzes will be administered on Canvas. There is one pre-scheduled on the syllabus.

Compiti a casa (homework): Some of the required viewings will require the completion of an activity packet with a short reading and exercises (in Italian) that will be used to guide in-class discussion and may be turned in for a homework grade. These assignments count towards the homework portion of your final grade and will NOT be accepted late.

Since there is no designated textbook for the course, not all assignments are listed on the syllabus. That is, photocopies of readings and activities will be handed out periodically in class and may or may not be collected for a grade. **Required and optional** handouts, videos and readings will also be posted on Canvas throughout the semester, so be sure to check the platform daily. Announcements (including last-minute class cancellation!) will be posted on Canvas, as well.

Esame finale: Your final exam will be administered online via Canvas and will be cumulative. More details on what to expect and how to prepare will be given closer to the end of the semester.
