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Course Description

ITAL 1020 will continue to present the rudiments of Italian grammar in a communicative framework. Students will practice fundamental grammar structures, communicate at a basic level, both orally and in writing, and gain appreciation for the beauties of Italian culture.

Course Objectives

After completing this course, students will be able

- ✓ to converse briefly but competently in Italian about the weather, fashion, traditions, music, and cultural activities.
- ✓ to express obligation, preferences and desire, make excuses
- ✓ to tell time
- ✓ to handle past-tense narration in writing and speaking
- ✓ to identify and manipulate the elements of basic Italian syntax

Course Overview

ATTENDANCE: As in all language courses, attendance and punctuality are essential to success in ITAL 1020. Each unexcused absence over 3 will result in a 3% deduction from your final average (e.g. with 4 absences, a final grade of 91% becomes an 88%).

RENDIMENTO IN CLASSE (PARTICIPATION AND PREPAREDNESS): Learning a communicative skill like Italian requires intellectual effort and regular practice. Our class activities have been designed with this in mind, and your enthusiastic engagement on a daily basis will have a significant impact on your ultimate performance. Your participation grade will be assessed holistically, but includes things like arriving on time, completing your homework so you are prepared (all homework due dates are listed on the syllabus!), speaking Italian whenever possible, bringing your textbook, staying on-task, and working productively in groups. Basically, your participation grade will reflect the degree to which you are promoting a positive learning environment for yourself and your colleagues. Naturally, you cannot participate when absent, even should you miss for legitimate reasons.

COMPITI (HOMEWORK): Same as last semester, you will be assigned **online activities via Blinklearning.com**. I will assign a number of exercises per chapter that you will need to complete and submit on the due date, which will typically be the night before a chapter quiz. Activities will be assigned within the

first week of each new chapter. To access the exercises, you **must** click on the link that is emailed to you. Since you have a few weeks to complete the activities, no late homework will be accepted.

ESAMI (CHAPTER EXAMS): At the end of each chapter, you will have a chapter exam **in class** on a designated day. There will be **four total** and the exercises will reflect the material covered in class from that chapter. No make-up tests will be given without official documentation, no exceptions.
