Course Description & Objectives:

Adventure in Japanese Songs will take you to the world of amazing songs in Japanese! A variety of songs in different genres and time will be introduced throughout the course. The lyrics and music are the key component in gaining analytical view and understanding of Japanese culture and the history from the perspective. Classes are conducted entirely in Japanese using video clips to bring the class straight into the world of the songs. It provides prospect in learning the visual culture as well as promoting listening comprehension through the context of the music and the words. The important aspect of the class is to enjoy Japanese songs first! while learning the heart of Japanese cultures and the thoughts behind the invention of the songs. Students will learn new words and expressions associated with songs and music; at the same time, it provides chances to review their learned material in the light of new perspective. This course will help intermediate and advanced level students to develop in-depth understanding and knowledge to further appreciate the live and popular culture of songs. The art of songs will create new awareness in Japanese language and culture. The view will connect, compare the Japanese songs with their own and beyond. The course presents an entertaining way to learn language through songs and shed light in the learners' minds.

At the end of this class, you will be able to:

- Understand language structure and expressions through variety of songs
- Appreciate different types of Japanese songs in association with history, regional culture, and modern trends in global community
- Understand Japanese culture strongly associated with songs and music
- Understand Japanese music business and industry through songs and the artists
- Gain insight to help understand Japanese culture through music and words in a higher level
- Have better listening skills, pronunciation, intonation, rhythm, pitch, intonation, and fluency
- Discover your own interests in songs and compile a list of favorite songs to share with others ...and there are many more things you can do!

Course Eligibility:

This course is designed for students who have finished second year college-level Japanese. <u>Prerequisite: JAPN 2050 or the equivalent.</u> Students who have studied Japanese informally or in high school may test into this level and receive credits for courses skipped by taking the placement test. Expectations and Grading Policies:

Participation

Foreign language learning is a cumulative process, and it is very important that you come to class. Class participation is mandatory and essential to your success in learning Japanese. Full participation credit (16 points per class) will be given to those who are present for the entire class period, prepared for class, fully participating in all activities, and using Japanese whenever possible. Partial attendance or lack of participation will result in deduction of points. Your two (2) lowest scores in class participation will be dropped. Absences will only be excused in the case of university-sponsored activities, religious holidays, military service, or extended illness with documentation. After two (2) unexcused absences, you will lose 16 points for each absence. See the UNT attendance policy for details at https://policy.unt.edu/policy/06-039. If you miss a class, follow the schedule and use the materials on Canvas to keep up.

Lack of participation includes frequently speaking English, spending class time on your phone or doing work for other classes, refusing to work with your partners during group work, etc.

Assignments

Assignments include a variety of items such as listening practice, vocabulary list, reading material, journal/essays, speaking tasks. Material will be provided on CANVAS and in class.

Worksheets

You will have worksheets of different types. The lyrics of songs for in-class activity are assigned to study at home further based on the class discussions and analysis. Then, responding to questions related to the lyrics on Canvas. You are expected to study vocabulary list as well as to create your own vocabulary list to develop the comprehension of songs and the concept in music. It is important practice, and you should display your effort and learning by submitting your own accumulated words and expressions. Late homework is accepted for partial credit (-10% / day). When homework is submitted more than two weeks late, it will not be accepted.

Homework

You will write about assigned topics, then post your responses on CANVAS Discussions. Submissions will be evaluated based on adherence to guidelines, content quality, and your demonstrated understanding of the language and concepts covered in class.

Vocab Quizzes

There will be eight (8) vocabulary quizzes. To promote understanding of songs and periphery of concepts, the vocab will be selected and discussed in class.

There are no make-ups for guizzes. Your lowest vocabulary guiz will be dropped.

Reading Quizzes

You will have five (5) reading assignments throughout the semester. For each assignment, read and take the quiz set up online. Reading assignments are graded on comprehension in addition to completion. Your lowest reading quiz will be dropped.

Speaking tasks

You will share your favorite songs in each class. The title and the lyrics should be prepared and posted before the class on Discussions. The format will be discussed in class.

Presentation

The first one is on Japanese idol research and the presentation in pairs. You will post the links of two most representative songs by the idol you presented (keep your thread).

Projects

This is your independent final project to showcase/share your cumulative and comprehensive knowledge from the course and beyond. An inquiry on all the material and topics from this course will be encouraged to use to compare and connect with new thoughts.
