COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course serves as an introduction to the field of art education.

Prerequisite(s): Pre-major status in Art Education or consent of department

OBJECTIVES:

TX Classroom Teacher Pedagogy Standards:

- <u>Instructional Preparation</u> Teachers understand how students learn and prepare for instructional delivery by designing lessons, evaluating instructional materials, leveraging their knowledge of students, and engaging in a thorough process for lesson internalizations.
- <u>Instructional Delivery and Assessment</u> Teachers intentionally apply their knowledge of students and the learning process to implement high-quality instruction and assessment practices that are research and evidence-based and informed by student work.

- <u>Learning Environment</u> Teachers maintain a safe and supportive learning environment that is characterized by respectful interactions with students, consistent routines, high expectations, and the development of students' self-regulation skills.
- <u>Professional Practices and Responsibilities</u> Teachers are self-aware and consistently hold themselves to
 a high standard for individual development. They collaborate with other educational professionals,
 communicate regularly with stakeholders, maintain professional relationships, comply with federal,
 state, and local laws, and conduct themselves ethically and with integrity.

TX Art Educator Standards:

- The art teacher understands how ideas for creating art are developed and organized from the perception of self, others, and natural and human-made environments.
- The art teacher understands the skills and techniques needed for personal and creative expression through the creation of original works of art in a wide variety of media, and helps students develop those skills and techniques.
- The art teacher understands and promotes students' appreciation of art histories and diverse cultures.
- The art teacher understands and conveys the skills necessary for analyzing, interpreting, and evaluating works of art adn is able to help students make informed judgments about personal artworks and those of others.

• The art teacher understands how children develop cognitively and artistically, and knows how to implement effective, age-appropriate art instruction and assessment.

- Assignments submitted 1 day late will receive 70% credit.
- Assignments submitted 2+ days late will receive 50% credit.

- <u>Teaching Philosophy Statement</u> (5% of final grade, due October 13) Students will develop a personal teaching philosophy statement that articulates their core beliefs about teaching and learning. See Canvas assignment for further details.

• Evidence of Progress Made on TEXES Practice Exam (10% of final grade, part one due August 25, part two due December 1) Students must demonstrate progress made toward passing the TEXES Art Content Practice Exam by providing scores, results, and self-reflective analysis. - <u>Curriculum Slam</u> (10% of final grade, due November 17) Students will work collaboratively to create and present an overview of their lesson plan. See Canvas assignment for further details.
- <u>Lesson Plan</u> (15% of final grade, due December 8) Students will develop and submit a completed lesson plan for art students. See Canvas assignment for further details.
- <u>Class Participation</u> (15% of final grade) Students will earn 'participation points' by engaging with the learning content presented in each class.
