COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course serves as an introduction to the field of art education.

Prerequisite(s): Pre-major status in Art Education or consent of department

OBJECTIVES:

TX Classroom Teacher Pedagogy Standards:

- Instructional Preparation - Teachers understand how students learn and prepare for instructional delivery by designing lessons, evaluating instructional materials, leveraging their knowledge of students, and engaging in a thorough process for lesson internalizations.
- Instructional Delivery and Assessment – Teachers intentionally apply their knowledge of students and the learning process to implement high-quality instruction and assessment practices that are research and evidence-based and informed by student work.
- Content Pedagogy Knowledge and Skills – Teachers show a full understanding of their content and related pedagogy, and the appropriate grade-level Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS)
- Learning Environment – Teachers maintain a safe and supportive learning environment that is characterized by respectful interactions with students, consistent routines, high expectations, and the development of students' self-regulation skills.
- Professional Practices and Responsibilities – Teachers are self-aware and consistently hold themselves to a high standard for individual development. They collaborate with other educational professionals, communicate regularly with stakeholders, maintain professional relationships, comply with federal, state, and local laws, and conduct themselves ethically and with integrity.

TX Art Educator Standards:

- The art teacher understands how ideas for creating art are developed and organized from the perception of self, others, and natural and human-made environments.
- The art teacher understands the skills and techniques needed for personal and creative expression through the creation of original works of art in a wide variety of media, and helps students develop those skills and techniques.
- The art teacher understands and promotes students' appreciation of art histories and diverse cultures.
- The art teacher understands and conveys the skills necessary for analyzing, interpreting, and evaluating works of art and is able to help students make informed judgments about personal artworks and those of others.

- The art teacher understands how children develop cognitively and artistically, and knows how to implement effective, age-appropriate art instruction and assessment.

MATERIALS: All required readings/materials will be made available on Canvas. Any student having difficulty accessing resources, technology, or other important needs is encouraged to contact the professor.

ATTENDANCE: Students are responsible for regular and punctual attendance and are expected to participate in all courses in which the student is enrolled [[06.039](#)]. Course Policy:

- Four or more absences will result in a failing grade.

LATE WORK: Students are responsible for completing all assignments and submitting them on time.

Course Policy:

- Assignment extensions will only be considered if requested prior to the due date.
- Absences do not affect assignment due dates and are still due regardless of class attendance.
- Assignments submitted 1 day late will receive 70% credit.
- Assignments submitted 2+ days late will receive 50% credit.

STUDENT EVALUATION & ASSESSMENT: Evidence of learning and progress made will be assessed through the following course assignments:

- CYC Activity Plan (20% of final grade, due dates vary) - Students will develop one (1) 45-minute art-making activity to be taught at the UNT Center for Young Children (CYC). See Canvas assignment for further details.
- Teaching Portfolio (50% of final grade, due dates vary) - Students will develop a variety of components found in a professional teaching portfolio. See Canvas assignments for further details.
- Evidence of Progress Made on TExES Practice Exam (15% of final grade, due dates vary) Students must demonstrate progress made toward passing the TExES Art Content Practice Exam by providing scores, results, and self-reflective analysis. See Canvas assignment for further details.
- Class Participation (15% of final grade) - Students will earn participation points by engaging with the learning content presented in each class.
