# Foundations of Sacred Music Syllabus (MUSM 5284 and MUAG 4740)

### **Course Description**

This course is an introduction to the historical, theological, and biblical foundations of sacred music. The class will also explore the use of the lectionary and church year in planning along with suggested repertoire and resources. The goal of this class is to help students explore, analyze, and engage sacred music through the chronicling of historical developments and engagement with historical voices and narratives.

### Course Structure and Calendar

Due to COVID, this course takes place 100% online and will be a combination of asynchronous and synchronous learning. You will be able to access reading assignments, video lectures, and podcasts via Canvas at any time throughout the week. You will also be able to participate in Canvas group chat discussions regarding the material. Our synchronous Zoom sessions take place in lieu of a face-to-face class session. They are on Fridays from 1pm to 3pm and video. Other than that, your interaction with me and with your fellow students will take place in Canvas.
