Course Description

An exploration of worship and the role of sacred music in the 21st Century Church. Various styles and contexts of worship and arts ministry will be explored through reading, lecture, and projects.

Course Goals

- learn how to select hymns and other appropriate music for congregational worship using the Revised Common Lectionary and other resources.
- learn basic practices for contemporary and supplemental ensembles in the church music ministry.
