**Course objectives:** Law and economics is a young and emerging field in economics. In addition, it is used as a major theoretical model at major law schools. This is an excellent course for any student considering enrolling in law school or any economics student interested in the economic analysis of the law. The purpose of this course is to demonstrate how to apply economic analysis (marginal analysis, opportunity cost, demand and supply, the importance of incentives, etc.) to legal and political issues.

This course will analyze topics in “private” law rather than “public” law. Private law covers the areas of property, contracts, and torts (accidental harm). Criminal law and regulation are also examined. If time permits, we will examine some public law topics.

**Prerequisites:** The only required class is Economics 1100: Principles of Microeconomics. If you have taken intermediate micro (Econ 3550 or Econ 5030) you will have an easier time grasping some of the applications. However, the necessary theory will be covered in class. If you sense that you are experiencing difficulty please contact me immediately. I usually can assist you in covering any deficiencies.
