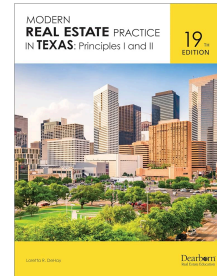

## Course Objectives

### Student Learning Objectives:

The Real Estate Principles and Practices course is a survey course; an introduction to the practice of Real Estate. It is general in nature and designed to prepare the student for further study in one or more specific areas of Real Estate Finance, Law, Marketing, Appraisal, Property Management, and Investment Real Estate, and to develop the skills to manage personal real estate. Students are expected to comprehend real estate terminology and contract features and to acquire the knowledge, judgment and expertise to understand the real estate process.

1. To introduce the student to the practice of Real Estate
2. To provide the student with the language and terminology of real estate
3. To prepare the student for a more in depth study of the key functional areas of real estate.
4. To prepare students to be more educated home buyers.

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**My Objective:** UNT, The College of Business, and I want you to be successful in your careers and in life. I will make every reasonable effort to be available and provide guidance to make sure you succeed in this class and beyond.

### Assignments

**Quizzes/Homework:** There will be a quiz during each class period that an exam is not scheduled. The lowest 2 quiz grades will be dropped at the end of the semester. The quiz will be at sometime during class, and you must be present to take the quiz. It will be a one-question quiz over something in your reading for that week, or a homework assignment. The lowest grade possible on the quizzes will be a 60.

**Each chapter will have an online quiz.** The online quiz will become available the Monday before each class period. You will have two attempts for each online quiz. The higher of your 2 attempts will be the grade recorded. The online quiz will be available the Monday prior to the date its chapter is scheduled in class and will remain open until the next scheduled exam begins. **Online quizzes must be completed prior to the start time of the next exam.**

### Exams

**Mid Terms:** There will be two (2) mid term exams. Exams will begin promptly at the start of class. Students who show up late will not be given extra time to finish. My goal is to prepare you well for the exams so that there are no surprises.

**Final Exam:** The final exam will be comprehensive, and is scheduled for **May 5th @ 2:00pm**

**Other Exam Info:** Take off headwear, sunglasses, earphones, headsets, etc. No cell phones or other electronic devices are to be used during an exam.

**Make Up Exams:** No make-up exams will be given. If you know you will be absent for an exam, you must make prior arrangements with the instructor to take the test prior to the rest of the class. Please see the **Responsibility to Notify** policy below.

These tools can provide useful feedback for improving grammar, clarity, or organization, but they must not be relied upon to generate substantive content or perform critical thinking on your behalf.

#### Permitted Uses of AI:

- Checking grammar, spelling, and sentence clarity
- Rephrasing your own writing for tone or flow (e.g., improving sentence structure)
- Asking for general writing advice (e.g., how to organize an argument or clarify a thesis)

#### Prohibited Uses of AI:

- Generating ideas, arguments, or outlines for your assignments
- Writing drafts, essays, or responses on your behalf
- Summarizing readings or producing answers without your own analysis
- Citing AI tools as sources in place of assigned materials or independent research

#### Guiding Principle:

You may use AI to polish your own thinking—not to replace it.

If you use AI tools in your writing process, you must be transparent. A brief disclosure (e.g., "Used ChatGPT to review grammar in draft version") is encouraged if you received meaningful assistance.

Improper or undisclosed use of AI may be considered a form of academic dishonesty, subject to the university's academic integrity policy.

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## UNT/College of Business Policies

**Academic Integrity Standards and Consequences.** According to UNT Policy 06.003, Student Academic Integrity, academic dishonesty occurs when students engage in behaviors including, but not limited to cheating, fabrication, facilitating academic dishonesty, forgery, plagiarism, and sabotage. **Severe Weather.** In the event of severe weather, all building occupants should immediately seek shelter in the designated shelter-in-place area in the building. If unable to safely move to the designated shelter-in-place area, seek shelter in a windowless interior room or hallway on the lowest floor of the building. All building occupants should take shelter in rooms 055, 070, 090, and the restrooms on the basement level or in rooms 170, 155, and restrooms 122, 182 or 183 on the first floor.

**Bomb Threat/Fire.** In the event of a bomb threat or fire in the building, all building occupants should immediately evacuate the building using the nearest exit. Once outside, proceed to the designated assembly area. If unable to safely move to the designated assembly area, contact one or more members of your department or unit to let them know you are safe and inform them of your whereabouts. Persons with mobility impairments who are unable to safely exit the building should move to a designated area of refuge and await assistance from emergency responders. All building occupants should immediately evacuate the building and proceed to the south side of Crumley Hall in the grassy area, west of parking lot 24.
