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Course Description, Structure, and Objectives

Course Description: The study of dating, courtship, and marriage relationships.

Objectives for courses in the UNT Language, Philosophy, and Culture Core Curriculum:

- To develop critical thinking skills,
- 2. To develop communication skills,
- To develop personal responsibility,
- 4. To develop social responsibility.

Course Prerequisites: This is a 2000-level course and has no prerequisites.

<u>Course Format</u>: The course will be 100% distance education and administered through the Canvas Learn system at UNT and will include 14 modules over 16 weeks. Content will primarily be communicated from textbook readings and online materials. The online content provides students with considerable flexibility in how they approach and process the material. Students can review content at any point and as often as desired. The overall goal of the provided material is to replicate the presentation in the traditional classroom. Students will explore topics such as relationship conflict, communication, power dynamics, family structures, and more. As a student in this course, the goal is for you to leave the class with healthy relationship skills such as appropriate conflict management, communication, safe dating practices, and knowledge on family dynamics.

How to Succeed in this Course

As an online course, your success is highly correlated to your ability to engage in independent learning. The vast majority of the information you will learn will be through the textbook. Later then becomes a crisis. Here are some guidelines for success in distance learning courses:

- <u>Set aside a specific time to work on the</u> course (readings, assignments, etc.) and then protect that time, just as you would if you were attending an in-person class.
- <u>Read the instructions CAREFULLY and follow them EXACTLY</u>. Your success in this online course hinges on your ability to read instructions carefully. If you ever have questions about an assignment, ASK!
- <u>Don't let technology determine your grade</u>. Leave extra time before an assignment deadline for internet issues, and computer snafus.
- <u>Actively engage in the course.</u> You will get out what you put into your learning in this course. The content of this course can really have a positive impact on your current and future relationships but ONLY if you're willing to engage in the content. If you are just going through the motions to complete assignments, skimming the reading, and giving minimal effort, that is what you will get out of it.
- <u>Don't hesitate to reach out</u>. Being online can feel like you're all alone. If you have questions, or just want to discuss a topic, I'm here for you.

<u>The BEST and QUICKEST way to reach me is through the canvas messaging inbox.</u> I am generally in and out of the course several times a day, and will typically respond in less than a day to those messages.

I check email once a day, and usually at the end of the day, so while I will respond to you as soon as possible, it may take a day or two to get and respond to your message. You can find my email at the top of this syllabus. My office hours are by request.
