Course Description:

The course examines using community assets for promoting positive community change. It considers the role of various community organizations engaged in these endeavors, particularly nonprofit organizations. Since community organizations often work together to bring about community change, the course looks at collaboration and the factors that foster and impede it; explores the means of identifying and approaching potential collaborative community partners; and focuses on the development of joint proposals and/or business plans. The role of volunteer managers and agency leadership of community organizations is explored regarding the manner that they provide resources for collaborative, community capacity building.

Students who have received undergraduate credit for this course may not re-take it for graduate credit.

Required Texts:

Homan, Mark S. Promoting Community Change, 5th Edition. Thousand Oaks, CA: Thompson Brooks/Cole, 2008. (eBook version is recommended)

Students with another edition of the book may find themselves disadvantaged in the course.

General Objectives:

A student who has successfully completed the course should be able to:

- 1. Define the basic elements of community resource mapping, community collaboration, and community capacity building.
- 2. Be knowledgeable about specific examples of community resource mapping, community collaboration, and community capacity building.
- 3. Understand the ecological theory and its application to development of services to families in a healthy community.

- 4. Be familiar with local agencies and their full range of services available for families in health, social, legal, educational, religious, social, diagnostic, and enrichment areas.
- 5. Be able to respond to identified community problems on the basis of theory and research in the social and behavioral sciences.
- 6. Understand the role of the volunteer manager and professional staff in the process of community resource mapping, community collaboration, and community capacity building.

Student Evaluation Procedures:

Students will be required to successfully complete all of the following assignments described below:

Demographic Analysis of Volunteerism and Program Need:

Each student will select a Texas city or community and produce a report discussing the implications for both volunteerism and nonprofit programming on the basis of census data for their city or community. These may be made available to nonprofit organizations throughout the state.

Environmental Scan/NP Program:

Students will use their Demographic Analysis of Volunteerism and Program Need to develop a nonprofit program or discuss ways to improve the existing nonprofit program for a nonprofit in the community on which the demographic analysis was done.

Ethics Web Site:

Students will locate a web site dealing with nonprofit organizations, preferably in Texas, and issues of ethics relevant to the course material. In addition to the web site, a paragraph or two discussing the web site will be provided. These may be made available to nonprofit organizations in Texas and throughout the United States.

Discussion Boards:

There will be weekly discussion boards usually focused on case studies in the Homan text.

<u>Exams</u>: There will be three exams. One exam is given at 5 weeks and one exam at 10 weeks with each exam worth 100 points. At the end of the course, there is a comprehensive final worth 200 points. These will be multiple choice and short answer essay exams.

Course Writing:

All writing must utilize the American Psychological Association (APA) Style Guidelines. A good resource on APA guidelines is found here:

Use these guidelines for writing the Team Analysis Paper and citing references. Use them for other writing on the discussion boards such as the case studies.

Graduate students will be required to work as a group to produce a comprehensive community mapping of a country in West Africa that includes a demographic analysis, identification of domestic and international assistance programs, etc. The expectation is that this report will be delivered to Engaged Beyond Borders, a UNT student organization affiliated with a U.S.A based nonprofit involved in international development. Graduate students will be responsible for portions of the report and their grade will be based on both the portion they produce and the whole project. This project is worth 100 points and will be added to the class total points and a percentage breakdown will determine the final grade.
