Course Description:

PACS 4300 is a face-to-face course supplemented by Blackboard Vista that reviews aspects of nonprofit organization management, especially the core competencies for certification by the Nonprofit Leadership Alliance found at this web address: http://www.nonprofitleadershipalliance.org/cnp/Our%20Core%20Competencies.pdf. The course does this by engaging students in high impact service learning projects that allow students to apply their knowledge and skills and to gain advanced knowledge and skills necessary for the projects.

Course Objectives:

A student who has successfully completed the course should be able to identify, discuss, and apply the basic knowledge and skills in these topical areas to nonprofit and volunteer management:

Student Evaluation Procedures:

Students are required to do the following in the course:

Participation in discussions:

Students are expected to actively participate in class sessions by asking questions and responding to the instructor's comments and questions. This grade will be based on weekly input from the student supplemented by the instructor's subjective analysis.

Quizzes:

There will be weekly quizzes over the assigned readings and lesson material unless otherwise specified.

Service Learning Project:

Students will preference one of two service learning projects for this class to demonstrate their learning of course related material.

One project is the ReStore Center operated by the Dallas Area Habitat for Humanity. The center uses volunteers but lacks a volunteer management system and the class members who preference this opportunity and who are assigned to it will work closely with Ms. Carrie Friday to develop a basic volunteer management system for the ReStore Center using the McCurley & Lynch model found in the book written by them titled *Volunteer Management*.

The other project is developing a strategic plan for the William T. Cozby Public Library at 177 N. Heartz Road, Coppell, TX 75019 (tel. 972-304-3655). This will entail data gathering, a workshop with student presentations, and development of a written report. Students will be working with the head librarian and her key staff as well as the library's board. The model for this strategic plan comes from the book *Changing By Design* written by Doug Eadie.

The service learning project is a major part of the course and a portion of each weekly class period will be devoted to it. Students are expected to develop a portfolio of their unique contributions to the group project including a reflective paper of 3-5 pages on the experience and self-evaluation questionnaire.

Final Exam:

As required by the university, the course will have a final exam and it will be comprehensive in nature. The exam will be an in-class written response to a case study. Students will provide their own blue exam booklet and may bring a one page outline or note sheet to use in writing the exam.

Course Writing:

All writing must utilize the American Psychological Association (APA) Style Guidelines. A good resource on APA guidelines is found here:
