COURSE DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVES:

This is the first semester course of the intermediate level of Spanish in which students will continue to develop their proficiency in the four language skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. This course will be student-centered in which a large percentage of class time will be spent practicing the language in pairs and small groups. Outside of class students will both practice and interact through various online activities.

At the end of this course students will be able to:

- Talk about health and well-being
- Discuss urban living and technology use
- Converse about the arts and cultural events
- Tell about the pressures of life and express unplanned events
- Report and describe past events
- Express feelings, opinions, preferences, and desires
- Recommend or tell others to do something
- Convey doubt, hope, and uncertainty

PARTICIPATION:

Class participation is a vital component to the language learning process. Your level of participation and preparation will be evaluated in each class, and you will receive an average score five times during the semester. MIDTERM EXAM:

The midterm exam will cover chapters 11 and 12. The listening and reading sections of the midterm exam will be administered one class prior to the written sections.

FINAL EXAM:

The final exam will cover chapters 13 and 14. Please note that the final exam begins with a listening section. Students arriving late may not have the opportunity to take the listening section.

OUIZZES:

There will be 8 quizzes assigned and completed during class time. They may or may not be announced and may cover grammar, vocabulary, culture, reading, or listening comprehension.

TASKS:

Throughout the semester a variety of task options will be offered, 8 of which you will complete. See the following "Tasks Requirement" document for specific guidelines and details.

Tasks Requirement

You will complete a total of 8 tasks for the semester.

All 8 tasks must be completed by Friday, November 10. Note that task grades will not be replaced, even if you complete additional (beyond 8) tasks.

Task Options

Discussions (8 max):

6 written and 2 oral activities via the discussion feature of Canvas will be assigned during specific weeks throughout the semester. Each activity will count as 1 task and you may complete a maximum of 8. Your instructor will explain the specific guidelines and assign the due date for each discussion.

Activities (4 max):

There will be a variety of activities to participate in this semester. You can attend a religious service in Spanish, visit the Meadows Museum or the Latino Cultural Center, or participate in another departmentally approved activity. You must submit a program. ticket stub, photo, or other appropriate documentation to receive credit for the task. The date of your attendance must be included in the documentation. You can participate in a maximum of 4 activities, each counting as 1 task.

ONLINE HOMEWORK:

You will be assigned a variety of online activities via Connect. Your online calendar will show the assignments and their due dates.

ORAL INTERVIEW:

Toward the end of the semester each student will have a short conversation in Spanish with a classmate covering the communicative functions practiced in class. Orals will be graded on content and detail provided, incorporation of grammatical structures and vocabulary studied throughout the semester, and use of communication strategies.

COURSE POLICIES:

Attendance Policy and Late Work

Class attendance is mandatory, and no late/make-up work will be allowed for unexcused absences. Only those individuals whose absences are authorized by the instructor will be eligible to make up any assignment missed. Excused absences include the following: illnesses, deaths in the family, religious holidays, military duties, and university sponsored activities. For illnesses and deaths in the family, documentation (physician's statement, obituary, etc.) must be provided the first day upon returning to class for the absence to be excused. Absences in observance of religious holidays are authorized only if students have notified the instructor in writing within the first 15 days of the semester. For absences due to scheduled (not emergency) military duties, students must present their documentation to the instructor within the first 15 days of the semester. For absences due to university sponsored activities, students must obtain authorized absence cards from the Dean of Students and present them to the instructor prior to the absence. After the 9th absence, whether excused or unexcused, 1 percentage point per absence will be deducted from the student's final score.

Academic Integrity

The UNT Department of Spanish adheres to the University's policy on Student Academic Integrity. For all pertinent assignments and assessments, the work must be the student's work only (unless otherwise indicated by the course instructor) and should reflect the student's level of proficiency. Students are prohibited from asking another person (i.e. a friend, tutor, or relative) to help them develop or compose a response (oral or written) in preparation for, or while completing, an assignment or assessment that will be graded and applied to the student's final grade in the course. This includes, but is not limited to, receiving outside assistance with drafting, revising, editing, or developing the content and structure of a response to an assignment or assessment question without consent from the course instructor. Also, the use of translation technology (any digital translation tool or app) is prohibited for all assignments and assessments and will be considered academic misconduct. Information "cut and pasted" or otherwise copied from other sources and used as answers in assignments and assessments will be considered plagiarism. If a student has any doubts whatsoever as to what constitutes any form of scholastic dishonesty, they should consult with the course instructor before submitting their work. Cheating, plagiarism, and other examples of academic misconduct defined by University

Policy will result in a zero on the assignment or assessment in question and may be reported to the Dean of Students.

Use of email

Student Issues with Instructors

- 2. If the issue is not resolved to the student's satisfaction, then she/he should email a written description of the issue to Dr. Ignatow (gabe.ignatow@unt.edu). Dr. Ignatow will also solicit a written statement from the respective instructor
- 3. Dr. Ignatow may meet individually with the student and instructor to resolve the issue
- 4. If the student is not satisfied with the resolution, she/he should contact the Executive Dean of the College of Liberal Arts & Social Sciences to discuss this issue
