Course Description:

This course explores the fundamental principles and practices of character development essential for stage performance. Students will cultivate their artistic growth by focusing on collaborative skills and the ability to effectively integrate a director's vision. The curriculum emphasizes both individual actor processes and the collective effort required to contribute to the overall story.

Course Overview: Students audition and then participate in directing exercises, classical and contemporary scenes. Serves as the acting ensemble for directing courses. May be repeated for credit.

Course Requirements:

A. Grading: Your creative growth and thoughtful responses constitute the major focus of this class. Therefore, open discussion and deep involvement are essential. **900 pts** of your grade will be based on attendance and promptness that includes active participation and being prepared.

1. Participation//Preparedness

- **Preparedness Expectations** 1st pass - Ensure all necessary materials have been acquired, thoroughly read, and researched. Each individual should possess a physical copy of the materials, including group members, if applicable. Ready to rehearse the material.
- 2nd pass - You've been actively rehearsing, memorizing your material, clarity of given circumstances, ability to engage in and explore techniques discussed in class and are making artistic choices. At this stage, you're fully committed and open to receiving constructive feedback.
- 3rd pass - At this point, your work is performance ready. You've fully utilized the rehearsal time, refining your work through each session,

especially our rehearsal session. Your choices are strong and clear, demonstrating confidence in your acting. You are wholeheartedly committing to the work, and it is evident in your performance. You are dressed and in appearance to the best of your ability to embody your character for convincing storytelling and to meet your needs as a performer.

2. Reflective Essay

100 pts of your grade will be based on writing a proficient reflective essay (**350-400 words, single-spaced**). **The reflective essay** as a self-assessment is a carefully crafted statement regarding the acting approaches, strategies, or methods attempted. It should include a concise and clear description of what worked or didn't work in terms of character exploration and final characterization(s); a concise and clear description of the challenges and triumphs experienced as a company member; and finally, a concluding statement of what was learned by engaging in an artistic process. The reflective essay is **due Monday, May 4, by midnight. Please upload the completed essay (either as word or google doc, or pdf) via Canvas**. The final semester grade will appear in letter form, according to the UNT grading system (i.e., "A," "B," "C," "D," and "F").
