COURSE DESCRIPTIONS: ARTE 4780: Pre-adolescent and adolescent creative development and theory examined in relation to contemporary art making practice in the secondary art classroom. Partial field experience component required (30 hours). Students must also make progress towards passing the actual TExES Art EC-12 Exam.

ARTE 5750: This course examines how educational, and art educational theory informs contemporary art education practice in both elementary and secondary art classrooms. In addition to scheduled class meetings, students are required to complete 56 hours (half in an elementary art classroom, half in a high school or middle school art classroom) of observation in an assigned location based on district decision. Students must also attempt the actual TExES art exam.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: It is anticipated that by the end of this course, students will be able to (SWBAT):

- Develop Craft—**Teach** the hook of a lesson,
- Engage and Persist—Devise and follow a study plan to successfully pass the art EC-12 **TEsES exam**,
- Envision—**Plan** high school art experiences aligned with **art TEKS** (<https://www.cedfa.org/standards>),
- Express—Communicate perspectives on peer-facilitated teaching during class **critique sessions**,
- Observe—**Witness pedagogical practices in middle and/or secondary contexts**,
- Reflect—**Consider professional growth** throughout the course,

COURSE STRUCTURE: This is a lecture-discussion and teaching simulation format course integrating your observation context experiences.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES: *You are considered a teacher in training in this course.* Timely attendance and participation are critical to your success. Assignments need to be submitted by the deadline. *If you anticipate needing more time to complete an assignment, please contact me ASAP, preferably in advance.* As a state requirement, observation hours **must be completed to pass this course.** Students must also attempt the actual TExES art exam.

STUDENT EVALUATION AND ASSIGNMENTS: Evidence of progress will be assessed through the following:

ART EC-12 TExES EXAM

- **REVISED STUDY PLAN:** [5% of final grade; due Jan. 29] You will put in place a Revised Study Plan working toward passing the Art EC-12 TExES exam before the end of the semester.
- **PROOF OF PROGRESS TOWARDS PASSING PRACTICE ART EC-12 TExES EXAM:** [5% of final grade; due Mar. 4]. Based on your revised study plan, you will work towards passing the practice exam and update your progress results.
- **PROOF OF PROGRESS TOWARDS PASSING ACTUAL ART EC-12 TExES EXAM:** [5% of final grade; progress to passing real exam due Apr. 29]. This is a state/university requirement for certification and advancement to your clinical practice semester. To earn your 5%, submit proof of your progress/results.

PLANNING

- **SECONDARY ART UNIT PHASE #1—UNIT PLAN TEMPLATE:** [15% of final grade; due Mar. 18]. You will submit your unit plan template for high school students on Canvas.
- **SECONDARY ART UNIT PHASE #2—LESSON TEMPLATE:** [15% of final grade; due Apr. 15]. You will submit your completed unit lesson plans on Canvas building off previous assignment.

TEACHING

- **INDIVIDUAL TEACHING:** [20% of final grade; presented in class]. You will teach an engaging, hands-on component of one of your lesson plans live during class time. Your teaching will last no longer than 15 minutes and you are to engage your classmates in this teaching simulation. You will be required to modify/adapt your teaching in relation to assigned, identified student needs.

OBSERVATIONS

- **OBSERVATION REFLECTIONS:** [18% of final grade, 3% each, 6 reflections in total; due Jan. 29, Feb. 12, Feb. 26, Mar. 25, Apr. 8, and Apr. 22]. Guided by the T-TESS domains, reflect on your observations answering all questions provided on Canvas.
- **OBSERVATIONS TIME RECORD:** [10% of final grade; state requirement to pass this course due Apr. 29]. **The requirement of 30 hours (56 hours for graduate students) must be completed this semester.** Your hardcopy signed Observation Time Record must be completed with adequate detail (see examples on Canvas course shell) in both hardcopy and digital versions by May 2. **Failure to do so will prohibit progress to clinical practice.**

CAREER PREPARATION

- **JOB APPLICATION:** [7% of final grade; course due Apr. 22]. Create and submit 3 items for teaching job applications and interview preparation: teaching resume, teaching philosophy, and cover letter for job application.
