This is a three-credit course that meets four times a week. In class (Monday, Wednesday & Friday), your main instructor will introduce new material and give written and oral exams. In the lab (Thursday), your lab instructor will take you through practice of what has been covered in class with a focus on speaking. In addition, you can expect to spend at least 6 hours per week studying outside of class.

Course Eligibility:

Course Description & Objectives:

This course introduces the four basic skills of Japanese -- speaking, listening, reading, and writing. Students will gain a solid foundation in Japanese grammar and develop practical written and oral communication skills.

At the end of this class you will be able to:

- Read and write 115 new kanji characters: JAPN1010 (62) + JAPN1020 (115) = 177 total
- Talk about family and describe people's appearances
- Talk about vacation plans, past experiences, etc.
- Quote what a person said
- · Give opinions
- Describe health conditions and give advice
- Use informal speech when appropriate
- Read and write basic letters, essays, etc.

Class & Lab Participation

Both class attendance and lab attendance are mandatory and absolutely essential to your success in learning Japanese. Full participation credit (10 points per class) will be given to those who are present for the entire class period, prepared for class, and fully participating in all activities. Partial attendance or lack of participation will result in deduction of points. The three (3) lowest scores in class participation and the one (1) lowest score in lab participation will be dropped. Absences will only be excused in the case of university-sponsored activities, religious holidays, military service, or extended illness with documentation (by permission of the program coordinator). It is not necessary to provide

excuses for other absences. Regardless of reasons with/without appropriate documents, you will lose 10 points for each absence. (Note for TAMS students: If you are absent for any reason, you are required to file an absence report with Dr. Gruver of the TAMS Academic Office.)

Assignments

Assignments will consist of worksheets done before class in order to preview the material for class each day and prepare yourself to participate fully.

Don't copy! The assignments are important practice and should show your attempts and corrections. Copying from the key or from another classmate is both unethical and counterproductive to your learning. Late assignments will be accepted only the next class day for partial credit. Your three (3) lowest homework grades will be dropped.

Quizzes

There will be three (3) quizzes per chapter quizzes, eighteen (18) quizzes over the course of the semester, over vocabulary and kanji. There will be six (6) grammar quizzes [online]. **There** is no makeup for vocab quizzes, but your three (3) lowest scores will be dropped.

Chapter Tests

There will be two (2) chapter tests, which cover every two (2) chapters: chapters 7–8 and chapters 9–10. Chapter tests focus on the grammar of the two (2) chapters, but also include both new and review vocabulary and characters. Each chapter test will include a listening section. If you are absent on the day of the chapter test one time, you can make it up, however, you are responsible for contacting your instructor. No excuse or doctor's note is required; however, in this case, you will miss the listening section (about 10%). After you have missed one test, you will no longer be able to make up tests, so make sure to look at the schedule and plan in advance.

Skit

You will be asked to work with a partner to write and perform one skit. The skits will measure your ability to communicate in Japanese.

Final Exam

There will be a cumulative final exam at the end of the course covering Ch. 7-12. Part of the exam will be multiple-choice and part will be written, including a one-paragraph essay. Please bring a Scantron sheet (882-E), #2 pencils, and an eraser to the exam. The exam is in the usual classroom.

Major in Japanese: The major consists of the six (6) foundational courses (JAPN 1010,1020, 2040, 2050, 3020, and 3030) and seven (7) mandatory courses including JAPN 4020, 4030, and five (5) topics courses that may be repeated (JAPN 3040, 3060 and 4040). All courses require a grade of C or higher.
