Course Description

Strings Class is a fundamental string techniques and pedagogy course designed to develop basic performance and teaching skills for violin, viola, cello, and/or bass. This course will help students learn beginner string playing techniques as well as best practices for teaching individuals and ensembles. This course is primarily an opportunity for you to learn how to teach yourself and others through thoughtful practice, reading, and reflection. There are no musical prerequisites for enrollment. Mastery of a string instrument is not expected by the end of this course. Regardless of prior experience, students should demonstrate a thorough understanding of course content, apply consistent and honest effort, and work effectively towards their own goals in the process. Success in this course will be determined by attending and participating in class, completing all assignments, working hard, integrating key skills, and practicing intention and awareness.

Course Objectives

- Acquire basic playing skills on violin, viola, cello, or bass.
- Develop diagnostic skills for teaching basic posture, position and performance in string playing.
- Explore and understand the features of popular string methods books.
- Comprehend instructional content and sequencing for teaching a string program.
- Understand the relationships between your playing, emotions, physicality, and choices.
- Any other objectives, topics, or content deemed necessary for inclusion in the course at the sole discretion of the Instructor.

Teaching Philosophy

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Attendance Policy

Attendance at all class meetings is required.

Three unexcused absences for any reason (aside from University-excused absences) will subject the course grade to being lowered by one full letter.

More than three unexcused absences will result in a failing grade for the course, as per Music Education Division policy.

If an unavoidable situation prevents you from attending class (for example, illness with a doctor's note), please email me before class to determine whether the absence can be excused.

Daily attendance will be taken by the instructor. All students are responsible for staying informed of in-class assignments, email or Canvas announcements, physical handouts, turning assignments in on time, and informing the instructor in writing of any circumstances affecting attendance or performance in class.

Use of Generative AI

In this course, the use of GenAI tools (i.e., ChatGPT, Claude, Gemini, etc) is limited as directed by the Instructor. Any additional use requires explicit permission, proper citation, and authentic student work. Students must ask the Instructor prior to any proposed use of AI and obtain permission each time. Lack of adherence to this policy may result in a failing grade.

Grading Policy

Attendance and Participation: 50 Points (50%)

Every class that you attend and participate in is worth 1.6 points.

Participation in class means being physically present and actively engaging with the instruments, content, and fellow classmates. A participation grade will be given to every student following every class. Careful listening, skillful playing, physical and emotional self-awareness, and integrating skills and ideas as needed are key.

Using a laptop, tablet, or mobile device for any purpose unrelated to the class or the course will be construed as a lack of participation.

Repeated instances of this behavior (except for University-approved accommodations) will result in a participation grade of "0" for the day.

Final Projects: 25 Points (25%)

Later in the semester, each student will select a Final Project to complete. Options may include peer teaching, a podcast interview, or an academic paper. See Canvas for details later in the semester.

Reflections, Assignments, and Discussions: 25 Points (25%)

Students will complete weekly written reflections to be submitted on Canvas. Other assignments and discussions may be assigned as necessary.

Late Assignments Policy

Late assignments will automatically receive a grade of "0" unless approval is given from the Instructor for alternate arrangements.

Any incomplete or not submitted assignments will receive a "0" at the end of the semester.

In general, I have found that late work disrupts learning, distracts from the original purpose of the assignment, creates unnecessary labor for the instructor, and increases stress for students. If there is a serious situation that prevents you from turning in work on time, I urge you to email me **before** the assignment is due to make alternate arrangements.

Financial Aid and Satisfactory Academic Progress

Undergraduates

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total hours registered. Students cannot exceed attempted credit hours above 150% of

their required degree plan. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.

Students holding music scholarships must maintain a minimum 2.5 overall cumulative GPA and 3.0 cumulative GPA in music courses.

If at any point you consider dropping this or any other course, please be advised that the decision to do so may have the potential to affect your current and future financial aid eligibility. It is recommended that you to schedule a meeting with an academic advisor in your college or visit the Student Financial Aid and Scholarships office to discuss dropping a course before doing so.

Graduates

Music scholarships require a 3.5 cumulative GPA. Students cannot exceed maximum timeframes established based on the published length of the graduate program.
