Course Description

Focuses on the techniques for editing technical documents, including proofreading; copyediting; and comprehensive editing for audience, content, organization, style, and design.

We will progress from basic editing tasks, such as copymarking and copyediting, to more complex responsibilities, such as comprehensive editing and document production. We will also review onscreen editing with MS Word. Because attention to detail is critical for successful editing, the course will focus on helping you develop your editorial eye and your editorial judgment, including maintaining good editor-author relationships. We will work with examples of editorial problems and perform practice exercises.

Course Structure

This course will be delivered completely online. You will complete one module per week for each week of the semester. I'll unlock a new module every week.

Course Prerequisites or Other Restrictions

The prerequisite for this course is Technical Writing (TECM 2700).

Course Objectives

By the end of TECM 4190, you will be able to:

- edit technical documents, from copyediting to developmental editing;
- revise for content, organization, style, and mechanics;
- perform onscreen editing;
- communicate editorial decisions/queries to authors; and
- describe the profession of technical editing.

Technical Requirements & Skills

Minimum Technology Requirements

As this is a senior-level course, you are expected to be familiar with the day-to-day operation of computers including UNT email (and sending attachments), Canvas, and standard software.

You are also expected to have regular access to computing technology, whether it be your computer at home or the computers provided by UNT. There are 14 computer labs on campus, including one 24-hour lab.

Hardware and Disk Media Requirements

Email Requirement

All students must have a valid UNT email address, as it is the only email address I can use to communicate with you. You can forward your UNT email to your regular account (Hotmail, Yahoo, etc.), should you not wish to directly check your UNT account. It is also your responsibility to check your email regularly. I often use email to send class emails, including notices, updates, and advisories.

- Treat your instructor and classmates with respect in email or any other communication.
- Always use your professors' proper title: Dr. or Prof., or if in doubt use Mr. or Ms.
- Unless specifically invited, don't refer to your instructor by first name.
- Use clear and concise language.
- Remember that all college level communication should have correct spelling and grammar (this includes discussion boards).
- Avoid slang terms such as "wassup?" and texting abbreviations such as "u" instead of "you."
- Use standard fonts such as Ariel, Calibri or Times new Roman and use a size 10 or 12 point font
- Avoid using the caps lock feature AS IT CAN BE INTERPRETTED AS YELLING.
- Limit and possibly avoid the use of emoticons like :) or ②.
- Be cautious when using humor or sarcasm as tone is sometimes lost in an email or discussion post and your message might be taken seriously or sound offensive.
- Be careful with personal information (both yours and other's).
- Do not send confidential information via e-mail

Grading

Your course grade is earned based on your performance on the assignments found by clicking Assignments in the left nav bar. This is a senior-level course. You should expect to spend a minimum of 6 **hours per week** on course-related work. Some weeks will require more.

To receive full credit for an assignment, your submission must follow instructions (from your instructor or client) as well as meet the deadline on the course schedule. I make every attempt to evaluate submitted assignments and post feedback/grades in Canvas within one week. For some assignments, I provide detailed feedback to help you improve your performance—as a professional. Ensure you know how to access that feedback within the Grades feature on Canvas.

I assign letter grades for the course based on the total sum of points earned on the assignments listed above. Those letter grades correspond to the following levels of performance.

A manager/client would be very impressed and would remember the work when a promotion is discussed. In this course, that means work that is a pleasure to read, with excellent content, A (900-1050 points) grammar, sentence structure, mechanics, and visual design. In addition, work is thorough, complete, coherent, well organized, supported sufficiently, and demonstrates a superior understanding of audience, purpose, and rationale.

A manager/client would be satisfied with the job, but not especially impressed. This means that work is well written and well produced, and demonstrates a substantial addition to the learning B (800-899 points) process. Work is sufficiently developed, organized, and supported, and demonstrates a solid understanding of audience, purpose, and rationale.

A manager/client would be disappointed and ask you to revise or rewrite the work before allowing clients and others to see it. In other words, the work may have clear, but C (700-799 points) underdeveloped ideas, or it might not engage or affect the reader. The work may contain some errors in grammar, mechanics, or logic. A manager/client would be troubled by the poor quality of work. This level of work forces the reader to work too hard to understand the main ideas. The work may contain D (600-699 points) incomplete information, have serious grammar and mechanical problems, lack clear organization, or be conceptually unclear. A manager/client would start looking for someone to replace you. In particular, the work

F (599> points)

fails to address the tasks of the assignment, is so underdeveloped as to demonstrate incompetence, and is mechanically and grammatically incomprehensible.

Course Evaluation

Important Notice for F-1 Students taking Distance Education Courses

Federal Regulation

To read detailed Immigration and Customs Enforcement regulations for F-1 students taking online courses, please go to the Electronic Code of Federal Regulations website (http://www.ecfr.gov/). The specific portion concerning distance education courses is located at Title 8 CFR 214.2 Paragraph (f)(6)(i)(G).

The paragraph reads:

(G) For F-1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken on-line or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination or other purposes integral to completion of the class. An on-line or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F-1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no on-line or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experience integral to the completion of this course.

If such an on-campus activity is required, it is the student's responsibility to do the following:

- (1) Submit a written request to the instructor for an on-campus experiential component within one week of the start of the course.
- (2) Ensure that the activity on campus takes place and the instructor documents it in writing with a notice sent to the International Student and Scholar Services Office. ISSS has a form available that you may use for this purpose.

Student Verification

Use of Student Work

A student owns the copyright for all work (e.g. software, photographs, reports, presentations, and email postings) he or she creates within a class and the University is not entitled to use any student work without the student's permission unless all of the following criteria are met:

- The work is used only once.
- The work is not used in its entirety.
- Use of the work does not affect any potential profits from the work.
- The student is not identified.
- The work is identified as student work.

If the use of the work does not meet all of the above criteria, then the University office or department using the work must obtain the student's written permission.

Transmission and Recording of Student Images in Electronically-Delivered Courses

- 1. No permission is needed from a student for his or her image or voice to be transmitted live via videoconference or streaming media, but all students should be informed when courses are to be conducted using either method of delivery.
- 2. In the event an instructor records student presentations, he or she must obtain permission from the student using a signed release in order to use the recording for future classes in accordance with the Use of Student-Created Work guidelines above.
- 3. Instructors who video-record their class lectures with the intention of re-using some or all of recordings for future class offerings must notify students on the course syllabus if students' images may appear on video. Instructors are also advised to provide accommodation for students who do not wish to appear in class recordings.
 - Example: This course employs lecture capture technology to record class sessions. Students may occasionally appear on video. The lecture recordings will be available to you for study purposes and may also be reused in future course offerings.

No notification is needed if only audio and slide capture is used or if the video only records the instructor's image. However, the instructor is encouraged to let students know the recordings will be available to them for study purposes.
