

GEOG 4885 – Human Geography Topics (Geography of China: Environment and Society)

Objectives

China is of global significance in many aspects. Developing a comprehensive understanding of China and its relations to the world is important. With an emphasis on the roles of geography/space, the objective of this course is to provide students background knowledge of China in order to better understand the current and future affairs related to China. Using a combination of the traditional regional geography and topical geography approaches, and new developments in social media and geospatial technologies, the course aims to create an effective teaching and learning environment. Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to: (1) describe major geographic features of China, including natural resources and physical environment; (2) describe the overall spatial distribution of Chinese population; and (3) interpret the recent development of China from a geographical perspective.

Course Project

Each student will develop an individual project related to the geography of China, submit a project report of 4 single-spaced pages (NOT including tables, figures, and references) to Canvas, and deliver a 10-minute project presentation. More details on the requirements will be provided in class.

The Department of Geography and the Environment does not allow extra credit assignments (work not specified on a course syllabus).
