Course Description

This course focuses on racial and ethnic relations in the US, from historical developments to contemporary issues, through a sociological lens. The course satisfies the Cross-cultural, Diversity and Global Studies requirement of the University Core Curriculum.

Course Structure

The course is structured around seven broadly themed modules, each covering about two weeks' worth of course materials. There are readings and assignments specific to each module but you have considerable freedom to progress in each module at your own pace, keeping in mind assignment deadlines. A detailed breakdown of module readings and course assignments is provided on Canvas.

There are no course prerequisites for this course.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will have:

- A solid foundation of knowledge about sociological approaches to studying race and ethnicity
- An understanding of the social construction of race and ethnicity and how it is related to other forms of social inequality
- The ability to comprehend and effectively summarize research studies related
- An awareness of how personal experiences are shaped by societal forces

Course Policies

Late Work and Extensions

Details for all the course assignments and deadlines are available before the start of the course so that you can plan accordingly. However, I understand sometimes students need extensions. With this in mind, all assignments (with the exception of the final paper, quizzes, and any extra credit or optional assignments) have a no-questions-asked 24-hour courtesy extension. As long as assignments are submitted within 24 hours of the original due date, they will not be penalized for lateness.

Assignments submitted after the 24-hour courtesy window but within 48 hours of the original due date will have 10% of the score deducted. Assignments submitted after 48 hours but within 72 hours of the original due date will have 20% of the score deducted. Assignments submitted later than 72 hours from the original due date will receive no credit. Students do not need to make any special arrangements to make use of this policy.

If there is an emergency that requires a longer extension, you must contact me for accommodations before the assignment deadline. Further extensions will be provided solely at my discretion. I recognize that COVID-19 presents unique challenges and intend to be as flexible as possible in determining assignment extensions.
