**Course Purpose:** To provide the student with the basic concepts of the most commonly known Afro-Latin American music styles, popular and folkloric. The course will emphasize Afro-Latin percussion performance practices and techniques, a brief history of Afro-Spanish Caribbean and Brazilian music cultures, and an introductory study of the leading artists/masters of the language. The information acquired by the student through lectures, research, and live performances will provide a solid general foundation in the language. The newly acquired knowledge will serve the student well in improving their musical abilities as a listener, performer, composer, arranger, and music educator.

**Attendance Policy:**

1. Since all information and practical experience will be provided in class, attendance is **MANDATORY**. **Any more than two (2) absences will lower the final grade, one letter grade per absence.** Students should give notice if they cannot attend class. The absence notification will only be sent by text or email before class. **The students will be responsible for the material covered in class during their absence.**
2. It is **IMPERATIVE** to be on time for class and rehearsals. Students who consistently show up late for class without a reasonable excuse will be penalized by a **reduction in their final grade.**
3. **Concert and performance times are subject to sudden changes. Dress rehearsals will take up to three (3) hours, and it is not recommended to**

schedule students' activities on the same day as the dress rehearsal or performance. Failure to attend and participate in the semester's final concert, dress rehearsal, or any other public or private performance will result in a failing grade.

### Ways of Communication:

3. All class members must complete this task by the end of **week 1 (Thursday, January 15, 2026).**
4. **The student will be responsible for attending to any unscheduled task, activity, or performance that could be announced through the chat service or UNT email.**

### **Rehearsal Room Use Policy:**

1. After every class/rehearsal, all ensemble members must organize the room into a class format, following the organizational format posted at the door. **No one will be dismissed until the room is in order.**
2. **All ensemble members** will help store the equipment in the storage room in an organized manner and lock the door when finished. The **storage room door should be permanently closed when not in use.**
3. After chores are done, please review the room for any trash that can be collected and deposited in the garbage container on your way out.
4. The default status of the room (Bain101) doors is "**locked**" when they are not in use. **All Performance, Jazz Studies, or Music Ed Students must ensure all doors are closed and locked on the way out.**

**Performance Dress Code:** For the ensemble's concerts and performances, you must wear white pants or white skirts (ladies only, please). Failure to comply with this requirement will lower the **final grade.**

### Hearing Protection is Required for this Course:

Hearing protection is **MANDATORY** for every student registered. The [UNT Speech and Hearing Center](#) [Links to an external site.](#) will provide a hearing test to every enrolled UNT student for a flat fee of \$25. In addition, “musician’s ear plugs” can be purchased at the clinic for around \$200. The College of Music provides foam ear plugs at no charge; students can pick these up from the repair shop in the Music Annex, room 106.

### Grading Policy:

1. **Concert Performance is 5% of the Final Grade: A.** The semester concert will feature musical pieces from the Afro-Spanish Caribbean folkloric repertoire.
2. **One Comprehensive Final Exam is 50% of the Final Grade.** All information presented in lectures, handouts, student class presentations, and performances will be examined on the test.
3. **One Playing Exam is 20 % of the Final Grade.** The class will be divided into groups. Each group will test on the cáscara/campaneo modes on Tumbadoras, Bongó, and Timbal.
4. **Group Styles Research and Class Presentation are 20% of the Final Grade** (Read Group Styles Research and Class Presentation section).
5. **Listening Test is 5% of the Final Grade:** The class will be tested on identifying aurally a variety of styles from the Latin American repertoire studied in class.

### Group Styles Research and Class Presentation:

1. The class will be divided into groups by style for their PowerPoint presentations. Each student or group will be assigned to give a 15-minute class presentation on a Folkloric/Popular Cuban Music Style.
2. The student or group will provide a handout of min. 2/max. Four pages long for each student in class, based on the format found in the **Styles Research Handout Format** provided in the Modules section of this CANVAS page.
3. The use of audiovisual material is highly expected. (PowerPoint, CD Tracks, YouTube, etc.)
4. Only information from scholarly sources (Textbooks, biographies, dissertations, periodicals, documents, and CD/LP cover reviews) will be admitted. Wikipedia is a good starting point for information searches, but it is unreliable as scholarly documentation and will not be admitted as a bibliographic source. A minimum of 4 sources (only one Online entry of the fourth required source) is required on the handout.
5. The 4<sup>th</sup> Floor of Willis Library (A.K.A UNT College of Music Library) has many text resources to assist you. These resources will only be used in the library. I intend to make them available to all class members and familiarize everyone

with the resources accessible to them at our music library. Also, **meet your librarians**. They are there to assist you in making your quest for knowledge enjoyable.

6. A word of advice: **Rehearse your presentation and time it**. This will help you to manage your limited time and focus on communicating the most essential features of the material you are presenting.

### Graduates
