Course Objectives:

This course focuses primarily on common compositional techniques and the harmonic vocabulary of twentieth-century musical practice. We will primarily focus on diatonic modes, symmetrical scales, set theory and twelve-tone technique. Other topics include bi-tonality, rhythm and meter, as well as modernist and postmodernist traits and approaches after 1945.

Pre-Requisites: MUTH 2400 (Theory III) and MUTH 2410 (Aural Skills III), both with a grade of C or better.

Co-Requisite: MUTH 2510 (Aural Skills IV)

Homework:

Ten homework will be assigned throughout the semester (please refer to Course Schedule for exact dates). Please submit printed hard copies to me in-person at the start of the class on the due dates. Please work independently on these assignments—please come up with your own answers instead of working together with your classmates. You are encouraged to reach out to me through email or schedule an appointment with me if you have any questions regarding the homework. I am happy to help!

If you have to submit the assignments late, please email me prior to the due dates (all of them are on Monday) and time (which is, the start of the class on that day). **If you have emailed me ahead of time**, I would usually be happy give you a 48-hour extension and ask you to submit it at the start of the class on Wednesday instead, given that these remain as occasional occurrences. Any further extensions will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis. Any **unexcused** late submissions (i.e., if you have not emailed me beforehand) will not be accepted, unless there is a compelling reason.

Tests:

Three Tests will be taken place in-person during the semester (please refer to Course Schedule for exact dates). If you cannot come to class on those days, please email me prior to the start of the tests to schedule a make-up exam.

Attendance and Participation:

Attendance, punctuality and active class participation are crucial to success in this course. Students are expected to actively participate in the course, including being prepared for class by completing all assigned reading and listening materials, as well as engaging in class activities and discussions. As stated by the University Policy (<https://policy.unt.edu/sites/policy.unt.edu/files/06.039%20Student%20Attendance%20and%20Authorized%20Absences.pdf>), students will be excused for religious holy day, participation in an official university function, required military service, pregnancy and parenting, as well as when the University is officially closed. Unexcused absences could affect not only the attendance, but also the participation portion of this part of the rubric. For anticipated absences with a valid reason, students should contact the instructor through email before class, notifying the instructor of the situation and explaining the reason(s) behind the absence. If you are feeling unwell, please send me a quick heads-up prior to class time (if possible), and send me a doctor's note afterwards. Students with six or more unexcused absences may receive a failing grade (F) at the instructor's discretion.

Final Project:

Students will work on a final composition project, which is due at the end of the day (23:59), on May 2 (Saturday), which is the final exam day for this course. Please submit this project electronically on Canvas. More details and a rubric will be provided later in the semester. Please note that unless there is an emergency or a compelling reason, late submissions will **NOT** be accepted for the Final Project.

Return of Student Works:

The instructor will aim to grade and return students' assignments in a week's time, with the exception of emergency situation, in which case students will be notified. For example, if an assignment is due on Monday, the instructor will have them graded and returned in class on the Monday after at the latest. Grades will be posted on Canvas around that time. If the student does not attend the class, the instructor will return the assignment to that student the class after. For final projects and exams, students can expect grades and comments to be posted on Canvas within 72 hours after deadline of submission.

Scheduling of End-of-semester Jury:

Students should not schedule their end-of-semester jury against a regularly scheduled class. Please refer to the course schedule for class meeting time and avoid scheduling end-of-semester jury during those dates and time.

Generative AI (Artificial Intelligence) Policy:

Throughout the semester, using Generative AI (GenAI) tools (mainly Large Language Models (LLMs) like ChatGPT) to generate (in particular, text) responses in your Homework and Final Project is not allowed. However, using AI tools for spelling and grammar checks (e.g., Grammarly) for correct errors from individual words and/or very short phrases (i.e., a few words) is allowed. I would not recommend using tools like Grammarly to paraphrase phrases and sentences, as they often do not give the most suitable results in the context of your writing. However, if you have a compelling reason to do so, please make sure you disclose that you have used it (and how) in the assignment. Please evaluate suggestions given from these tools very carefully.

In this course, I may use GenAI to enhance the visual aspect of course materials (e.g., PowerPoint slides), and/or occasionally to proofread (for spellings and grammar). I will always disclose how I use GenAI, and I expect the same from you. Outside of this course, as a composer, I have worked on music and visual art projects that involves the use of different AI tools, including GenAI.

In accordance with the UNT Honor Code, unauthorized use of GenAI tools is prohibited. Using GenAI content without proper credit or substituting your own work with GenAI undermines the learning process and violates UNT academic integrity policy. If you're unsure whether something is allowed, please seek clarification.

Undergraduates
