COURSE DESCRIPTION

In ENGL 1320, you will be introduced to invention strategies, reading strategies, and writing approaches that will help you thrive as writers in a university setting and beyond. With an emphasis on brainstorming, critical reading, analysis, and revision, you will practice genre conventions, gain rhetorical knowledge, and develop a framework for producing persuasive writing about issues that are important to you. One of the broadest goals of this course is to help you become comfortable with strategies for making your writing compelling to the audiences you want to reach. Defining, explaining, persuading, finding, and evaluating good sources—these are all ways to provide insight into topics that you want to share with other people. Overall, ENGL 1320 will prepare you for a wide range of writing expectations, including those that demand research, evidence, and careful argument.

Students in this course will be able to:

- Hone and develop reading, writing, and research skills through practice, repetition, and careful attention to style and strategy
- Develop a relevant research question
- Locate and analyze academic sources to use as evidence
- Synthesize sources into a larger analytical argument
- Draft and revise a research paper that is appropriate to academic audiences
- Learn to collaborate with peers and provide useful feedback

THE WRITING ASSIGNMENTS (PROMPTS ON CANVAS):

MAJOR ASSIGNMENT 1 – RESEARCH PROPOSAL

This unit focuses on reading sources for information and insight, as well as formulating a specific research question around an issue you want to write about and explore. You will draft a research proposal at the end of this Unit.

MAJOR ASSIGNMENT 2 – ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY

This unit focuses on defining the context for the issue you have chosen and locating sources that offer perspective on the issue. You will draft an annotated bibliography at the end of this unit.

MAJOR ASSIGNMENT 3 & 4 – RESEARCH ESSAY ROUGH DRAFT AND FINAL DRAFT

In this unit, you will plan and write a clear, focused, and well-researched essay that addresses the issue you have chosen to write about. You will learn about how to work a paper from a rough draft into a polished final draft. You will submit both a rough draft and final draft of your research paper for this unit.

“MAJOR ASSIGNMENT” 5 – REMIX AND REFLECTION

This assignment is in quotation marks because it is not a major assignment - not really. Since we do not have a formal “final exam” in this class (your final Research Essay is your final exam), this is an assignment you will turn in during finals week. For this assignment, you will turn your Research Essay into something that is not an essay - a poem, a painting, a flyer, etc. The only writing you will do for this assignment is a 100-word explanation of what you chose to do and why, as well as a 100-word reflection of the course. I give extensive extra credit for this assignment if you put in effort, which has raised students’ grades considerably.

GENERAL CRITERIA FOR WRITING ASSIGNMENTS

Although specific rubrics will be provided for each larger writing project, all writing activities in this course generally must meet the following requirements and demonstrate the following desired outcomes.

- **Critical Thinking:** The written activity explains insights that the writer has gained through careful consideration of the research and reading done in the course. The writer coherently represents the complexity and nuance of the ideas they are writing about.
- **Clarity of Communication:** The written activity shows that the writer understands course material and has read widely enough to help audiences understand the significance of the idea they are writing about. The background context and the question the writer is addressing are both coherent and thorough enough.
- **Organization and Structure:** The written activity is clearly organized with a structure that allows audiences to understand its main point as well as the supporting examples and sources that contribute to the main point.
- **Consideration of Other Perspectives:** The written activity demonstrates careful listening to course ideas, course texts, and to consider other perspectives related to the topic the writer is addressing. The writer considers the cultural and social implications of their topic and argument.

TEXTBOOK

Your textbook, *Rhetorical Transformations: Complex Conversations*, is completely free to you. It is uploaded to Canvas as a PDF. You do not need to print a physical copy unless you want to.

SCHEDULE OF ASSIGNMENTS

Each module for the next week will be unlocked on the Sunday before. Due dates for Major Assignments will be posted on Canvas, but they will most likely all fall on Sundays. Everything else will be due in class before you leave for the day.

LATE ASSIGNMENT POLICY

My policy has always been “better late than a zero.” I would rather you turn in something late than not at all (zeroes are detrimental in the gradebook), but keep in mind that points will be taken off depending on how late it has been turned in. The highest late score I give is a 70%. All papers are due by the date specified in Canvas, unless you as a student have previously made arrangements with me. Note that you cannot pass the course if you have not received a grade for all major assignments. Please meet with me as soon as possible if you miss a deadline for an assignment, or if you need an extension. Again, I know that life happens, and sometimes you just need more time. I am more than willing to work with you - you just have to communicate with me.

A Warning About AI (Artificial Intelligence)

THE USE OF GENERATIVE AI WRITING TOOLS IS 100% PROHIBITED IN THIS CLASS.

Assignments for the course have been designed to help you develop as a thinker, reader, and writer without using these technologies. You will generate ideas, read, revise, and write independently or when appropriate in consultation with peers, UNT Writing Center tutors, and me. Any use of generative AI in your work for this class (LLMs) violates our syllabus and thus will be treated as an instance of cheating as per UNT policy. Additionally, ignorance of the generative AI tools in your chosen digital writing technologies, whatever they may be, is not sufficient to excuse the violation. If you are unsure about a digital writing tool (even automatically integrated ones), don't use it for this class. Do not even use it to generate ideas. We will do that together.

TO REPEAT: PLEASE DO NOT USE ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE TOOLS OR SOFTWARE UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES, not even tools like Grammarly to check your grammar mistakes. I promise you that it WILL show up on Turnitin, the software we use to scan for plagiarism.

Here's how the process will work:

- 1) I am grading your assignment and either become suspicious of your writing or see that the turnitin detector is above 10% or inconclusive. I will then cross-reference your assignment with another AI detector.
- 2) If that detector also shows up as positive, then that is when I will leave a comment on your assignment letting you know.
- 3) I will give you a zero on the assignment **ONLY** so that you will see my comment, as Canvas does not automatically notify you that I have left one. This **DOES NOT** mean your final grade is a zero. It means that you need to make an appointment to speak with me in person.

4) You will reach out to me and either explain what may have happened. Sometimes, apps like Grammarly can trigger the AI detector. Sometimes, turnitin can glitch. Sometimes, repeated use of a word or punctuation can set it off. Regardless, you need to set up an appointment with me to talk about it in person. If you did not use it, fantastic! I will grade your assignment as normal and remove the zero. In some circumstances, I will ask you to redo the assignment entirely.

5) If you admit that you did use AI, then I will formally input the zero in the gradebook as final, and will not give you the chance to redo the assignment. Alternatively, if you do not talk to me within a week of me leaving that initial comment (either by leaving a comment, emailing me, or speaking with me after class, I will formally input the zero in the gradebook as final, and will not give you the chance to redo the assignment.

6) It is policy that I then report the incident to The Office of the Provost and the Office for Student Success, who are responsible for issues concerning academic integrity.

I would much rather you turn in something incomplete or imperfect and have it be *your* work, rather than it be flawless and written with AI. Make mistakes! In fact, I encourage it. This class is meant to help you become better writers and to help you articulate your ideas effectively - if you use AI, it defeats the purpose entirely. I know that AI can seem attractive because it can help your phrasing and organization - but if you use it, it completely erases what makes your writing *unique* in the first place.

DO NOT USE AI - IT'S NOT WORTH IT. If you have any concerns about this throughout the semester, please speak with me.

INSTRUCTOR RESPONSIBILITIES AND FEEDBACK

My responsibility as your instructor is to challenge you, to help you understand the course material, and to help you grow and learn as a student. I will provide clear instructions for projects and assignments, answer your questions, and identify additional resources as necessary. I will also provide substantive feedback on your written work. You can expect me to have **feedback and grades returned to you within one to two weeks of the submission date** for each assignment. If it takes me longer than that to grade a rough draft, I will happily give you an extension on the final draft.

COMMUNICATION

When you need to reach me, follow these practices:

- Respect the personal identities and privacy of yourself, me, and others.
- Respect identities based on gender, sexuality, race, ethnicity, class, and/or culture.
- Think carefully about what you reveal and do not reveal, particularly if this information involves your health and/or classroom performance. If your emails contain any information that causes me to be concerned for your safety or the safety of others, I am required to report it.
