Course Description

Although Chaucer is foremost among writers in the English language, reading *The Canterbury Tales* is just plain fun. Part of the pleasure derives from Chaucer's invitation to readers to participate in the game of deciding which pilgrim tells the tale with the best "sentence" (meaning) and the "moost solass" (most pleasure). While making this decision cannot be the sole focus of the course, it is a helpful one because it encourages us to keep in mind that Chaucer is a talented ventriloquist and that there is really is no offended Reeve who insults the Miller with his tale, no actual mouthy Wife of Bath on the lookout for husband number six. This realization, in turn, will compel us to study some of the many facets of Chaucer's literary imagination such as his command of genre, prosody, and theme. Each of us will have a say, though, about who should win, and even if we're bound to disagree, we're likely to finish the course wishing that Chaucer had finished *The Canterbury Tales* and given us more to judge.
