### Course Goals

There are three broad goals for this course: to instill an appreciation for different genres of literature and to develop skills in literary analysis; to give students the opportunity to think broadly about the development of the American literary canon; and to give students a framework for encountering literary traditions movements, themes, genres, and historical/cultural contexts associated with American texts and authors.

### A small word of caution:

Many of the texts in this course address adult themes, sometimes using adult language, and may contain frank representations of racial discrimination and violence, discrimination and violence against individuals because of their sexuality, gender discrimination and violence against women, and religious discrimination and violence motivated by and against specific religions. Students are expected to approach these issues with maturity and respect. Conversation must in all cases be courteous, and honor difference as represented in these texts, and as represented by your classmates. Students should expect a certain amount of discomfort in discussing these issues, but are strongly encouraged to talk about that discomfort in class and with the instructor. See "Acceptable Student Behavior" below.

# **Course Policies**

#### Communication

UNT-provided email is the official mode of communication for this class.

### Attendance

This is not a lecture course. A significant portion of the learning in this course will come from in class discussion. As such, attendance is required. You may have two unexcused absences. Being more than 15

minutes tardy for a class will count as an unexcused absence. Your grade will be impacted by 1/3 a grade level for each unexcused absence. (So if you otherwise have an A in the course, if you have four unexcused absences, you will receive a B for the course.) In class work including quizzes, group activities, and in class writing cannot be made up.

Excused absences for religious observance, sport participation, or other authorized official university activity must be cleared with the instructor in advance. Absence due to illness must be accompanied by a physician's note to be excused. In the event of an excused absence, an alternative to in class work may be assigned.

# Participation

All students are expected to be actively engaged in class discussion, peer review, and other activities. Failure to engage in class will negatively impact your participation grade. All students are expected to come to Office Hours at least once during the semester.

All students are expected to be on time for class, to have completed the assigned reading for that session, to come prepared with writing materials including pen and paper, to bring the assigned text to class.

### Technology in class

Laptops and tablets are acceptable in class for taking notes and accessing course materials only. Any student using laptops or tablets for social media, email, or other activities unrelated to class will lose their tech privileges for the rest of the semester and receive a 0 for participation for that session.
