Catalog Description:

Design, construction, and forming using basic techniques with an emphasis on sculptural forms and containers. Prerequisites: 2 of the following: ART 1600, ART 1700, ART 1800

Course Description:

An introductory course in metalsmithing that explores the techniques, terminology, and processes of working with metal. Students will receive instruction on sawing, soldering, shaping metal, finishing metal, creating cold connections, and adding color to metal through enameling.

Course Disclaimer:

Metalworking requires some dexterity, hand-eye coordination, and the ability to perform repetitive fine motor tasks. Key physical demands include holding and manipulating small components with precision, often requiring good close-up vision (aided or unaided) and moderate finger/pinch strength and grip strength to manipulate tools, wire, and metal. Please speak with your instructor if you believe you are unable to do these things.

Project Descriptions:

Project 1: Concentric Naturescape (100 points)

Design and fabricate two cylindrical objects that represent an imaginary landscape. Inspired by a work of literature, one cylinder will rest inside the other to create a 3D setting or scene. The project will incorporate pierced negative spaces with silhouetted shapes that will rest upon a hammered disc.

Project 2: Articulated Wearable (100 points)

Design and create an articulated wearable that combines multiple elements into a coherent design. The design will incorporate demonstrated techniques in tandem with a researched persona. The piece is not necessarily a direct reflection of the persona, but rather a tribute/embodiment of that person.

Project 3: Encased Enameled Pin (150 points)

Design and fabricate a small metal casing with a textured back and narrow sides. The casing will hold an enameled object using tabs or rivets. A simplified pinback mechanism will be soldered on to the casing to allow for wearability. The object will be inspired by an artist of your choice.

All samples, maquettes, and projects are due at the beginning of class.

The course schedule reflects expected class progress in course subject matter and is considered tentative. The course schedule is subject to change in content and scope. The instructor will provide verbal and written notice of all syllabus changes.

Class Participation Expectations:

I expect you to attend every class. You are responsible for completing all the required assignments. I expect all students to participate in class discussions, contributing ideas and perspectives on topics or art. All your work should incorporate aspects or issues addressed in class in relation to your personal or professional interests.

You are expected to assist in maintaining a classroom environment that is conducive to learning. To ensure that everyone has an opportunity to gain from time spent in class, unless otherwise approved by the instructor, you are prohibited from using cellular phones, checking your email or surfing the internet, updating your social networking sites, eating or drinking in class, making offensive remarks, sleeping, or engaging in any other form of distraction. Inappropriate behavior in the classroom shall result in, minimally, a request to leave class, which will be counted as an unexcused absence

Attendance Policy:

Regular and punctual attendance is mandatory.

TWO absences will be tolerated without having a negative impact on your grade.

More than three consecutive absences will require a note from a doctor. Please refer to UNT policy 06.039 (Student Attendance and Authorized Absences) for details on what types of absences can be excused. This note must be turned in within TWO WEEKS of absence to be excused.

More than TWO absences will lower your final grade by half per additional absence (3 or more)

Most lectures, demonstrations, and assignments will occur at the beginning of class periods and will not be repeated for those who come in late. If you are late for class, you will need to notify me at the end of the class period to replace an absence with a tardy. A tardy is arrival 5 minutes after the beginning of class.

Arriving to class later than 15 minutes or leaving class early will result in an absence.

Examinations, quizzes, and in-class assignments missed may only be made up with an official doctor's excuse or note from the art office excusing the absence for a reason covered under UNT policy 06.039 (Student Attendance and Authorized Absences).

Critiques missed may not be made up and grades will reflect the student's failure to participate in the critique discussions. If the absence is excused, an alternate method for critique will be provided.

Please contact me if you are unable to attend class. It is important that you communicate with me prior to being absent so I may decide whether to accommodate your request to be excused from class.

Late Work Policy:

Late work will be subject to a penalty of 10% deducted from the assignment's value per day the work is late, unless the student provides proof of an acceptable mitigating circumstance: serious illness, death of a family member, or other circumstance if approved by the instructor.

Best Practices for Health & Safety / Metalsmithing & Jewelry Studio Rules

Wear appropriate clothing - no loose sleeves, scarves or neck ties, no hanging jewelry.

No open-toed shoes, sandals or bare feet.

Keep long hair tied back.

Keep work benches clear of books, papers and clothing.

Do NOT leave torches lit when not in use.

Do NOT light torches with cigarette lighters.

Do NOT put hot metal objects into acid solutions.

All acid spills should be flushed with water immediately and neutralized with baking soda. Inform the instructor of any such spills.

Wear safety glasses or a face shield when using all machines.

DO NOT USE ANY MACHINE OR EQUIPMENT WITHOUT PRIOR INSTRUCTION. If it hasn't been demonstrated to you by the instructor, do not use it.

REPORT ANY ACCIDENTS, BROKEN TOOLS OR EQUIPMENT OR SAFETY INCIDENTS TO YOUR INSTRUCTOR AND/OR TECHNICIAN.

People who are not registered for a metalsmithing & jewelry class at UNT are not permitted to be in or use the studio facilities without express consent of the faculty. This includes children and the pets of students.

Course Safety Procedures
