Course Description

MUAG 1224 is a class for instrumental music majors to learn the fundamentals of correct breathing, tone production, diction and basic vocal pedagogy.

Class Participation

When you are present in my class, I expect you to be fully engaged in the lecture and discussion time. A large part of the learning process is through active observation, listening, and discussion. Below are ways you will be expected to participate.

- Being an active listener, asking questions, and being open to discussing topics covered in class
- Singing on assigned singing days (exceptions given in emergency situations only)
- Trying new and sometimes challenging exercises with your classmates
- Maintaining a positive and supportive atmosphere for vocal discovery and growth

Homework Assignments

Homework assignments will be given at the end of class and will be expected to be handed in at the beginning of the next class. These assignments are meant to help you process the information presented during class.

- o All homework assignments will be worth 20 points each
- Late homework assignments will not be accepted for any reason.
 - If have an excused absence on the day the homework is due, e-mail your assignment to me before the end of the class period.

In-class Listening Quizzes

Listening quizzes will be given at the beginning of class on the days assigned. These quizzes are not to 'trip you up,' but are designed to assess your retention of the assigned listening for the day.

- Quizzes will only be provided on the assigned quiz day, as outlined in the course schedule
- Quizzes will always be worth 20 points each
- o Quizzes missed for any reason will not be made up and will result in a 0%

Tests

There will be three tests over the course of the semester. The first two tests will be treated as take-home-tests and will be completed online through Blackboard. The third test will be an in-class test. All tests will be focused on material presented within the unit – they are *not* cumulative. Tests may include multiple choice, matching, fill-in-the-blank, short answer, essay, and/or listening questions.

- Tests will only be provided on the assigned test days
- o All tests will be worth 100 points each
- Tests missed for any reason will not be made up and will result in a 0%

Recital Attendance/Reviews

Experiencing vocal performances by others is necessary to the development of our own voices. We can learn posture, breathing, tone production, resonance, articulation, and characterization by watching what others do – and, in some cases, don't do!

- Students will be required to attend 2 vocal performances throughout the semester. (Solo vocal recitals, choral, opera, musical theatre, or other *teacher-approved* events ONLY).
 - A list of vocal performances can be found online at http://calendar.music.unt.edu or in the display cases in front of the Main Music Office or the Copy Room of the music building.
- Students must provide a recital program and written review to receive credit for recitals attended.
 - Reviews must be 1-3 pages in length and must follow the outline provided to you by your instructor.
 - Reviews and programs are due on the assigned date as outlined in the course schedule. Late reviews and programs will not be accepted and failure to provide them on the assigned date will result in a 0% for the assignment.
 - o Recital reviews will be worth 50 points each

Art Song Analysis Papers

At the core of vocal music is the text. Since texts inspire musical settings, an essential process of studying vocal music is studying the connection between the text and its musical setting in a piece. In the second half of the semester, you will have two short art song analysis papers in which you will be asked to delve into the connection between the text of a piece and its musical setting.

- o Art Song Analysis Paper #1 (due April 17th, 2018)
 - o For this analysis paper, students will choose one song from the provided list
 - o 3-5 double-spaced pages
 - An outline will be provided as to what is expected
- o Art Song Analysis Paper #2 (due May 5th, 2018)
 - o For this analysis paper, students will write on the piece they choose for Performance #2
 - o 2-5 double-spaced pages
 - An outline will be provided as to what is expected

Song Performances

I do not expect perfection. I expect progress. Everyone's progress in singing will be unique to them. If a student demonstrates that he/she has been actively working on the assigned piece and is making progress in the areas outlined on the grading rubric, the student will receive a sufficient grade.

All students will perform two solo pieces throughout the semester. Both songs will be sung on the assigned performance days. Missed performance days will only be 'made up' under emergency circumstances. All other reasons for missing your assigned singing day will result in a 0% for the assignment. Each song performance is worth 100 points.

The instructor will provide guidance and support to the student throughout the learning and performing process by offering vocal technique, performance, diction, and style instruction in both group and individual learning environments. An accompanist will be assigned to the class.

For all master class and performance situations, performance attire will be expected.

Song Performance #1 (March 8th, 2018)

- After an individual meeting with each student, the professor will assign an English piece from the vocal anthology provided in the textbook to be performed with music on **March 8**th, **2018**.
- This first performance will be graded on completion rather than merit. If the student sings on the assigned day, he/she will receive a 100%. If a student does not sing on the assigned day, the student will receive a 0%. No exceptions.

Song Performance #2 (May 10th, 2018)

- All students will choose one piece to perform from memory for the final on May 10th, 2018. The
 song will be chosen from the provided list of options below, all of which can be found in the vocal
 anthology provided in the textbook.
 - (Songs outside the textbook may be chosen if the student has received instructor permission and can provide both complete sheet music and accompaniment).
- We will go over the diction to any foreign language text chosen in class together.
- Each student will sign up for a 25-minute slot to perform their selected piece in front of their classmates in preparation for the final performance. This will run in a master class style where the student sings in front of his/her peers and the instructor teaches a public lesson to the vocalist. This is a time to explore and create, so mistakes are not only acceptable... they are encouraged!
- This performance will be graded on a 100-point rubric, which is available on Canvas
